Steve Hutton (Portugal), Winner

This is my first win in a Diplomacy-related game. If it's this easy, I wonder why I haven't been able to do it before.

I think that Portugal has the best chance of winning this variant, which is why I placed it first on my preference list and was surprised that no one else did. Portugal should be able to carve out a four-centre fief (Chile, La Plata, Matto Grosso, Brazil) without getting anyone else upset. He will then have a corner position where he can only be attacked from the north or by raiding fleets from the east. He will also have exclusive access to the Pacific Ocean.

I first allied with the Aztec because he was the only power who could have any realistic ambitions in South America. We agreed to fight Spain together. Aztec armies took Central America while my fleets fought Spain in the West Indies. Meanwhile, in North America, England and France were fighting each other and were deadlocked. This was fine with me. But North America was the only place the Aztecs could get any SCs, so we had to pick a side in the E-F war. We ended up allying with England.

The next few seasons I fought Spain, and England and the Aztecs fought France. My war went very well, and was aided by some NMRs and tactical blunders on the part of Spain. The Aztecs were also growing, and England was afraid they might go for a win. Everytime he said this, I told him that the only centres the Aztecs could gain were in his area, so it was his responsibility to keep them from winning. I wanted to create a certain amount of dissention between England and the Aztecs.

The question I kept asking my allies was: what do we do after Spain and France go? England said he wanted a three-way draw, which is not surprising since he was the weakest member of the alliance. The Aztecs never indicated a willingness to attack England. Since I didn't think a three-way draw was very impressive in a five-player game, I began to seriously think about stabbing the Aztecs.

The turn I eliminated Spain, I positioned my other units against the Aztecs. By coincidence, England had just asked me to move some units near the Aztec to "keep him honest." That was just the icing on the cake. If England and the Aztecs had allied with France that turn they could have stopped me. But, England continued to fight France and write to me asking me to take only a few centres and settle for a three-way draw. I don't think he realized just how good my position was or how bad the Aztec position was.

The Aztecs had good tactics, but Central America is a totally indefensible position. England's efforts to stop me were far too little and far too late. Had he made peace with France two years ago, he could have had a three-way draw (England, France, Aztecs), but he blew it.

I'd like to thank Ron for being a good GM, and Chip Charnley (Aztecs) for being a good ally and a worthy opponent.

Fred Davis (England)

It was an interesting experiment to see the use of the optional Indian Power in this version (Chip rechristened them "Aztecs"). This changed the game slightly in that the invading Europeans had to take account of someone else already being there. This had less effect on England and France than on the others, as the Aztecs tended to be strongest where the Spanish and Portuguese tried to land. The Indians started off strong, as they had no opposition to their occupation of certain Western SCs, such as California and Saskatchewan. However, when the mid-game period arrived, they were greatly constricted by their inability to build any fleets. This virtually gave the southern half of the board to Portugal after the Spanish disappeared.

For some reason, France (George Mills), decided to attack me from the beginning. I have no idea whether it was purely for tactical reasons, or whether something more subtle, like an attempted alliance between the two Canadian players (France and Portugal) in the works. Anyway, Mills never wrote me, attacked heavily, and lost the gamble. I was able to form a good alliance with the Aztecs, and together we were able to reduce France to a single on-board center.

Meanwhile, Dan Wilson's Spain suffered from two NMRs, which soon caused him to lose all his on-board SCs. Under the rules this eliminated Spain, although his off-board (European) center would have entitled him to keep one fleet on the board. Spain's ineffectiveness and rapid demise left the entire South American continent to Portugal.

I did not hear from Portugal (Steve Hutton) in the early part of the game, although I'd written to him. Finally, I moved a F to the South American coast to "attract his attention." When Steve protested, I reminded him of the old joke about hitting a mule with a 2 X 4 to get his attention. We then had a good correspondence.

I tried to form a three-way alliance between the Aztecs, Portuguese, and myself. Had we been able to eliminate France sooner, the Aztecs and English could have moved some units southward to protect our positions. The board is so linear in the north-south direction, however, that units committed to North America cannot easily go back to Central America or the Caribbean. At the end, Rick Young came up with a good plan for a joint English-French-Aztec move against Portugal, but it was too late to prevent Portugal from getting his 12th and decisive SC from the Aztecs, as we had failed to retake Antilles.

I think the game would play better with five European powers instead of using the Indians. This game was a demonstration of how weak a power can be when it has no ability to build fleets, in a game where fleets are as important as they are here. (There are only three in-land SCs in the game.) It also needs some "rounding" to make it more circular. Someone suggested fattening up the middle of the board by adding more SCs in the Caribbean and Central America. My idea was to add some SCs in West Africa and the Pacific, and perhaps adding a Panama Canal. This would have the advantage of not distorting the shape of the middle of the map.

A few more SCs would also make it more difficult for anyone to win. A 12-Center Victory Criteria (11 on the board and one in Europe) just seems too easy. I think that Portugal would have been more interested in a three-way draw had he had to gain, say, 14 centers, and had we been able to switch some units down south.

Lew Pulsipher designed the original Conquest variant, which was even smaller than my "II" version. As designer of "II," I guess it behooves me to see what I can come up with in the way of improvements. If I do so, I'll send copies to all of the participants of 1981 Qwc02.

One thing I found confusing was the use of a different year for each season. It was sometimes difficult to remember whether a certain season was a Spring or Fall move. I think I'll go back to using just the decennial years, with a Spring, Fall, and Winter in each of 1590, 1600, etc. It's still not clear whether Portugal won in 1644 (the "Fall" season) or 1648 (the Winter the SCs changed hands). I'd say the latter is correct. However, for SC count purposes in the zine, Ron had to show "1650," which is really the date the next set of Spring moves would have been made. We eliminate this by going to a straight three-season year. For the record, the game lasted through six regular cycles ("1906" in standard terminology).

Anyway, it was enjoyable to correspond with both Chip Charnley and Steve Hutton, and to receive the last minute well-thought-out plans from Rick Young, which gave a touch a real diplomacy to the last set of moves. Also, thanks to Ron Brown for his excellent job as GM. Thanks for a good game, guys.

Rick Young (France, 1620 - end)

It should please Ron Brown that the French were able to maintain control of Quebec, thus assuring him of a progressive Canadian province in 1983. For this I accept his undying gratitude.

Chip, Fred, and Steve: Let me make this perfectly clear (where have I heard that before?), I was trying to stab all of you on that last move. That was hard to do since I only had two units.

Ronald Brown (GM)

So much to respond to in all that! When I first saw the lineup for this game, I was looking forward to a classic battle. However, George Mills, the original France, was one of those brief sparks in the hobby, signing up for every game he could until the inevitable burnout hit. I'm not surprised Fred never got a letter from him; I never did either--George appeared to conduct his diplomacy entirely by telephone. Ditto for Dan Wilson once he was released from prison--the letters stopped and the reliance on the telephone began. I was pleased when Rick Young offered to stand-by, as I hoped to see this develop into more of a diplomatic and less of a strategy game. Not knowing what was going on between players, it looks as though Rick did start conducting negotiations, though his input came too late in the game.

I'm not surprised at Portugal's win. When I first studied that map for this game, my first thought was that one had to control the Cape. I expected to see a battle for control of the Falkland Sea, but, the way it developed, with a weak Spain, and and English-French battle, Portugal had control of the Pacific to himself. The Indians appeared strong in the beginning, but the lack of fleets eventually caught up with them.

Fred has sent me suggested changes, and I have ideas of my own which I'll include with other suggestions I've received. We all seem agreed that there are weaknesses in the design of the game, mainly geographic. I'm willing to give this one another go once all the changes are decided upon. Rick has already expressed interest. Any other takers? (I don't think I'll use historic quotes as headlines next time; I was running out of sources towards the end.) Thanks to everyone involved.

We'll see how it goes. I expect we'll have a mixture, as I've got articles typed up ahead. Pictures are easy if you go to the best printer in Ottawa. I've just been lucky on that score. As for the type-face, I'm using "Canadian Roman," so don't knock it.

Responses to items mentioned last month: Gary Coughlan (Memphis, Tennessee): "What was the 'super-human race' you mentioned in Snafu! 31? They just popped out of nowhere." Way back in the Travel articles I mentioned a couple I met in Nevada who told me about the super-human race living in Mount Shasta. I don't recall the

names, but these creatures apparently were discovered by early Russian explorers and are mentioned in Indian legends. They are supposed to be super-intelligent, about three foot tall, with enormous heads. They've built a paradise under the mountain, but you have to be "purified" before they let you see them--which is what all the hippies were doing up on the mountain. The Indian students in Maniwaki enjoyed that story and told me much more interesting ones about the creatures that inhabit the woods where they live.

Bob Olsen (Wichita, Kansas): "What's all this nonsense about Americans, quote 'glorifying punks, criminals, and assorted riff-raff' when you youself propose to publish letters from Dennis Duncan? Better get your own house in order first, Ron!" Hey, Bob, you mean you never saw an American-made movie?

Gary again: "There can be no coalition with Olsen or Hanson. No matter how they may toady to Canada, they retain the Yankee's hatred of the South. And, if it weren't for people like Olsen, Kansas would rightfully be a part of the South now. Canada and the Confederacy has a better ring to it. Minnesota and Kansas can join Québec."

Oh, oh, what have I started here? Kathy Byrne (Flushing, New York) jumps in: "Now look, I might tease the Canucks, but how you could join the South is beyond me. There is no comparison between the South and the Canucks! When our country was in a bad spot, the Canucks smuggled American hostages out of Iran. What did the South ever do for America? It started a Civil War! And then it couldn't even win it! So why not become a Yankee instead? Besides, we have better hockey teams!"

I wouldn't go dredging up history, Kathy. I mean, what about 1812 when Yankees invaded Canada and got their asses kicked, but good! I don't know what Canada's (actually, Britain at the time) policy was re. the Civil War. Probably sympathized with the South, except on slavery, which wasn't even much of an issue then. As for hockey, how many Islanders are Canucks? We win either way! Now these two want to argue about fish. Is there no end to it?

Kathy: "...eating catfish is gross! They have the big eyes which stare at you, and these ugly whiskers and besides it's just plain torture to eat the stuff! Woody eats it for a steady diet and look what's happened to him!" Sounds like some people I know.

Gary: "Ron. Ron. Ron. Haven't you heard of catfish ponds? This has become a very profitable industry down here in the South. The fish are mass-fed and produced. They don't slink off and scrounge stuff off of the muddy bottoms of rivers. At least not most of the fish consumed here." How be, when I'm in New York, I will not eat catfish, but when I'm in the South, I'll give 'em a try. Will that satisfy everyone?

Jim Briggs (El Paso, Texas): "...I'd just like to say that I enjoyed the Me'ANN'derings column. My sentiments exactly." Dave Carter: "Ann's comments about 'Christians' echo my own sentiments. I believe in a God, but I do not believe in Religion." Kathy Byrne: "Three cheers to Ann for 'Heaven Can Wait.' I have had my run-ins with thse self-proclaimed Christians and my only comment is that most of them are hypocrites. I agree with Ann: intelligence, common courtesy, and concern are the most important attributes a person can have. Also, common sense--I'm a firm believer in that."

Dave Lincoln (Cumberland, Rhode Island): "I really enjoyed Ann's article once again. (Yes, Ron, I enjoyed yours too.) It's amazing what a sensitive nerve you hit with your Christmas story, isn't it? For many people, religion describes the nature of the world beyond the range of our physical senses. For many, it seems to be a hostile and dangerous environment....I thought that way once, but now I'm more content just to be a man here and now. But perhaps the world is changing now, and the future that we all create for ourselves will be a kind one. Hope to see you all there."

Thanks. I agree with all of you, especially Dave's comments about <u>us</u> making the future. Whatever we are, or will become, is our own creation and we must bear responsibility for that. Maybe there's a God directing things, but as long as we <u>depend</u> on a "Big Daddy" in the sky to look after us, we're in trouble.

If you're wondering what the following is about, I have a House Rule governing press releases which says, in effect, that I do not accept Black Press, reserve the right to change datelines to show authorship, and am not obliged to print any item. There have rarely been problems, as, when people submit press releases datelined from somewhere other than their home countries, I've added the country of origin myself. I've occasionally cut items, but in Issue No. 30, I had a real space problem. The

easiest way around it was to cut <u>four pages</u> of press items which did not follow my House Rules. Bob Albrecht (Calgary, Alberta) wrote to protest and I answered him as best I could. Below is his response. Among the reasons I mentioned was cost and I quoted him the price of printing and mailing those four extra pages. (It was \$28 and change.) I'll answer one of his points right now: Snafu! is one of the most expensive zines in the hobby. I have striven to keep costs down as I simply cannot afford the loses I was incuring in the past. The fact that this zine is still being produced with, I like to think, ever-improving quality, after a year of my being unemployed speaks for itself. There is no way I am going to raise prices any further for trivial reasons. To do as Bob suggests (recover added costs through higher sub fees), would add another 30¢ per copy--and I would not expect the subbers to stand for such a rate increase. I wouldn't. But, let's hear Bob's side:

"I find your attitude regarding press disturbing. I think censorship, like Nazism, is very difficult to defend. Your cost figures are convincing, but what is stopping you from raising the rates and printing so-called 'questionable' press?

"Mind you, I recognize that this is a hobby and that you have your right to do what you please. But I think anyone who figures what he will print or not print--in other words, tells adults what they should read or not read--is very, very, dangerous. (Cf. Poland's Jaruzelski and any other of a host of oppressive regimes).

"...So my zine will be censorship-free. If you want press, fine and dandy. White, black, or rainbow coloured acceptable. Print as much or as little as you like on any topic, but don't look to me to 'protect' people's feelings by telling others what to do!

"Sorry to soap-box on you, but you touched a nerve. I always supect people who advocate unquestioned authority--for any reason."

You may feel, Bob, that Black Press should be allowed. Some zines allow it, some don't. But even those who do allow Black Press have guidelines. Let's quote from the most recent issue of No Fixed Address (which does allow Black Press): "I have heard that in games which allow Black Press, the press sometimes degenerates into a series of anonymous personal attacks. I have never seen this happen, and I won't see it happen in NFA. I have never censored a press release in NFA, but I am quite willing to if it becomes necessary."

When I told Steve of your letter he said he'd be delighted to send you a copy of War and Peace as a press item. I had something more prosaic in mind, like submitting an issue of Playboy and demanding it be printed in entirety as "press." Seriously, what are you going to do if someone submits an anonymous viclous attack on your wife or girlfriend? Are you going to print it, knowing it will cost you your relationship? Or, what about copyrighted items? As publisher, you'll have to bear the penalty.

Your submission that publishers are required to print all items received is absurd. If that were the case, our newspapers would be filled with lunatic ravings and crude pornography. And, why stop at the printed word? Why not demand that TV and radio stations be required to air everything submitted to them?

In any case, you are free to follow my House Rules or not. If you would like me to change them, argue with me first; don't violate them then call me names when I uphold them. Of course you are free to write whatever you wish. But, I, as a publisher, have a right to print whatever I wish. That's what free enterprise is all about. What you propose is not freedom; it's anarchy, the worst tyranny of all.

Dennis Duncan (Saskatoon, Saskatchewan) has much greater reason than Bob to complain about space restraints, yet he writes: "Please don't feel obligated to print parts of my letters unless you feel that they may be valid or interesting to your readers. I am not using Snaful as a soap-box."

No, I don't feel obligated (see my response to Bob Albrecht), it's just you do write about many topics I feel readers would be interested in, but I can't squeeze them all in and they tend to stock-pile. Here's some such items from previous letters: "I have an Atari computer system, manufactured in California. Fine. Dear sweet cat of mine managed to knock the cassette recorder off the table and the result was that the recording heads were knocked just slightly out of alignment...meaning that I could not read and load any pre-recorded, purchased tapes. Still with me? I took it to the local distributor and they were quite nice about...offering to replace it freebie, even though the warranty had just expired (probably because it would be very simple to repair in a shop). But they would have to wait a while until a new shipment came in.

Fine. Three weeks later and still no recorder. I asked them why. First they have to write the head office in Toronto who then contact the Atari plant in California, who then send a batch of replacements to Toronto who then decide, on the basis of preestablished priorities, who and when. Guess which region is on the bottom? Right!
