GENEVA (DWE) The alliance-of-necessity of Austria-Hungary, Italy, and Turkey may at last be breaking apart at its patch-work seams. Although Turkey supported the Italian conquest of Kiel this Spring, there were clashes in Constantinople between the occupying Italian marines and Turkish nationals. More significant, however, has been the sudden occupation of Marseilles, Munich, and Venice by the Austrians, and the seizure of Spain by the Italians. Is this trading of territory a co-operative effort?

Perhaps the coming months will answer the questions that seem to be on lips across Europe: Where will the Austrian Fleet now sheltering off the southern coast of Italy go? What is the destination of the Italian Fleet that left Tunis in February, heading east? Will Turkey survive until 1914? And, most important of all, has the malady that disposed of France as a Power now begun to affect the once-mighty British?

If only James Branch Water were here now!

WANTED: ALLIES Suffering would-be World Emperor desires correspondence with like-minded but better situated company. Object--mutual benefaction. Address: Kaiserliaw, Germany.

MAGADAN (DWE) A strange procession set out today, bound for more habitable portions of Europe. Traveling on mules procured from the monks of this monastery of St. Yurovdivi, who preferred to risk death at the hands of Russia's revolutionary Committee rather than see their "guests" remain longer, a strange collection of figures traveled down the precipitous path from the shattered gates of this sheltered place.

Included among the travelers were Nikolai II, Ivan VII, IVAN VIII, Alexander IV, and other former rulers of Russia. Also present were John Lewis, Gunther Schuller, and Charles Ben al Mingus, former rulers of Turkey, Miles Davis, John Coltrane, and Ornette Coleman, former Admirals of the Turkish Navy, Cecil B. DeMille, former producer of motion pictures and Emperor of Southern California, and John Boardman, noted composer of anti-war cantatas. Following in their wake came several hundred other men and women, of mixed nationality. The only common element in their backgrounds of the pilgrims was that each had once been a ruler of Russia, or at least a pretender to the Russian throne.

Rumor has it that this band, containing as it does some of the most cunning, capable, dissolute, and experienced strategists in the world, will soon be active as a band of mercenaries. This prospect has already caused marked changes in the foreign policy of several major powers, most notably in that of Turkey where Suleiman the Insignificant seems to be desperately pulling his forces northward to forestall an invasion by so many of his predecessors.

YOUNGSTOWN (DWE) John W. Smythe, local militarist and inventor, has announced yet another addition to the stock-pile of terror weapons, once more a product of his own dread laboratories. This weapon, known as the Intercontinental Brick Missile (or ICBM) is a fearsome device capable of hurtling Smythe's first terror weapon, the Brick, over vast distances. "Look out, Earl Thompson," was Smythe's only comment at press time, but rumors

On the next page begins the third YUDC-Scarborough game. You will notice that until it was ended in 1905, it was consistently a case of the English-Russian-Austrian alliance against the French-German-Italian. At the close of 1905, each side had 17 pieces. The set-up is thus perfect for a conclusion as a two-player strategy game. If two players would like to play the game out, I will act as Gamesmaster -- Free. If one man would care to take me on, I'm sure something could be worked out. Write if interested.

This is the third game played during the Scarborough-YUDC confrontation in November of 1955 (I suill haven't been able to decipher the first one), and on this date William Christian wasn't about se a six man game was played. In this game we departed from standard six man rules, using the instead the variation popular in both Scarborough and Youngstown. Turkey is, as usual, completely removed from the board. Bulgaria is removed as a supply center, but still exists as a province, allowing pieces to move into and out of Passage from the Black Sea to the Aegean still takes only one move. Both Scarborough and YUDC players feel that removing Bul-garia from play distorts the area around the Balkans too much. To my knowledge, Derek Nelson first proposed this revision.

Had Winter moves been made, England and Italy would each build one; Russia would have built two: Austria would have removed two. players conceded that if the alliance structure then in effect held up, Russia would be the victor (as was the case in the other two games played at Scarborough!). The tide would hinge on whether Italy could block Russia on both land and sea, while the English-Russian forces stalemated France in the North.

This game was played more kike a team Diplomacy game than anything else, and was notable for the fact that players on both sides gave up their own supply centers to their allies for strategic

purposes.
