

The two seats above -- England in 1964D and Turkey in 1965E -- will become vacant unless Castora and MacKenzie respond within the four week period (England has no "Winter 1912" move in Trantor I, and Massif I will be delayed for the Austrian retreat order). I will take as a replacement player -- FREE -- in each game the first reader (not already involved in the games concerned) to submit a set of moves ("Spring 1913" for England, "Fall 1908" for Turkey), providing Castora and/or MacKenzie do not respond. If you would like to play in either game, therefore, send in a set of moves for the next period in thick many therefore, send in a set of moves for the next period in which your country is involved.

Should Castora and/or MacKenzie wish to continue play, I will enroll the first reader to respond in each game as "Alternate player" in the game concerned. He will then stand ready to take up the torch should any player in future drop out... excepting France in

DEADLINE FOR "FALL 1901" MOVES IS SATURDAY, 7 MAY 1966

LONDON Great Things are happening in England these days. And greater still are the rumours of things that are happening or about to happen. Stories vary from lip to lip but this report will merely describe the events as they happened and leave you free to draw your own conclusions about the Rumours. We will express our opinion on just one item; we do not believe in the story of Dirigible Airfleets in Liverpool and of the Enlistment of Alein soldiery to operate them.

Every story must begin somewhere and since events before the return of King Arthur, or Artos the Bear, as his Knights call him, seem to be of lesser moment, we shall begin at seven of the clock last Monday morning - - - - -

A great white ship appeared in the Harbour, four masted, with smooth simple lines, and strange rigging that used one great pulley where an ordinary ship would use six. The effect of its appearance was remarked upon to be like an oversized sailboat. It glided smoothly up to the Queen's dock which has long been unused. Viking-like sailors slowed its appraoch by dropping anchor at the last minute and several of them leaped to the dock and tied the ship with just one rope, pulling the ship against the anchor-rope. All was quiet on the ship for a while and the crowd began to gather. A broad-shouldered figure appeared and gestured to two soldiers to put down a gangplank. He was not tall, but his walk gave the appearance of his being tall. He wore a long white robe and a plain silver crown. As he started down the gangplank, twelve knights followed in pairs. They wore light, chain-mail like armor. All wore swords but carried other weapons, such as morning-stars, maces, and axes.

Artos and his Twelve led a long parade, winding here and there the streets of London. The resulting confusion and traffic delays

caused many of the shops and banks to close their doors for a holiday. During this parade, which lasted nearly seven hours, neither Artos nor the Knights were seen talking to anyone except members of their own company, yet, somehow, before noon everyone seemed to know that this was King Arthur returning to England in its time of need.

There were at least a dozen reporters present but they managed to elect a spokesman. He was chosen because of his deep

and loud voice.

"Are you indeed King Arthur?" Al Lewis asked.

"I am, " Artos said.

"Why have you come back?"

"To lead A Crusade." Artos then threw back his Robe and drew a broadsword. He held the sword out at arms length in the manner of a salute. The reflection of the sun against its surface was nearly enough to blind those who were watching. No one attempted to guess at the alloy of the brightly shining sword, but it was estimated to weigh approximately seven stone. It was shaped like an elongated heart, four feet long and two feet wide near the hilt. He held that arms-length salute for ten minutes. "We must destroy the infidel, John Smythe!"

"No, that is merely the first step in a great plan to make the world free and safe for humanity. The overthrow of Smythe is merely the final test to see that England has grown strong enough to secure the Universe."

VERSAILLES (1 May 1901) Her Majesty, E. Barbara Philip, held her first press conference of the year. The

following is the text of her speech.

"As the earth begins its rebirth, so let me assure you that the Nation of France also seeks a renaissance. The renaissance we seek is in the hearts and minds of men. That man will not any longer continue his inhumanity to his fellow. That he will instead prove his worthyness of God's image by good deed and love for his compatriots."

It is hard to see the houses for the snow VIENNA (December 1900) in this capital city. One of the worst blizzards in the history of Austrian contemporary weather has blanketed the countryside with six meters (would you believe three

hands?) of pure, white, germ-free Johnson and Johnson snow. tiful stuff! The Emperor has been so excited of late that he is taking morning walks from the palace clear out to the mailbox. His wife says he's expecting a toupee from Sears Roebuck, but his doctor and press secretary insist it's the invigourating weather.

Yesterday morning I happened to be loitering along the paths of the palace gardens -- all snow-covered, of course -- when the Emperor lurched up to check the mail delivery. Being curious about such matters, I asked His Highness what the hell he was up to.
"Well, son," he belched, as though I were his son, which I am,

"seems like a right nice time for a little blood. Gad, this endless white is monotonous! I think we're going to start a war. On a pretext, of course... first rule of thumb in diplomatic treachery: Always propound a pretext, no matter how way-out." The expansive blob of monarch laughed uproariously, for some obscure reason.
"But daddy," I pressed on, "to whom are you going to send the

war lances?"

I should explain at this point that a new blood has been infused into European royalty with the current Austrian Emperor. My father is a full-blooded Sioux, Red Eagle Tomahawk Furd, who was aksed by the nobles of the Austrian dominions to ascend the

throne, much in the manner of William of Orange.

So anyway, the Emperor replied to my query with a shrill piping hiss in his throaty voice: "Hee hee hee hee hee... actually I don't know yet. It depends on how much money we are surreptitiously offered not to declare war. I understand Italy and Russia have made generous offers -- at least according to the Minister of Excess Sneers and Slaverings (M.E.S.S.), I. Haight Turquie."

Empress Sophia, whose real name is Fall Rock O'Donoghue, was securely tied in the wagon; local officials have organized search parties, the border crossings have all been alerted, and responsible authorities insist that "the Empress is still in Austria; we should have her back in twentyfour hours." They said that last night.

The Emperor continues to pace the floor of his money bin and mutter, "We'll find her! Falling Rock shall return. O ya foul vile beasts whose putrid hearts have abducted my fair red-skinned maiden, KNOW YE THUS that my strong Herculean (brag brag) will shall never be deterred until my sweet angelic sigh Falling Rock is once again back in my... yes, well, Justice Will Out. Semper Fidelis.

Amor Vincit Nasty Bandidos, and like that."
On general principles the Emperor has ordered reward posters and signs posted all over the kingdom. Thus there are many blackand-yellow signs along all the roads in Austria today, reading "Watch Out for Falling Rock."
