

ST. PEERIGRAD Dr. Peter H. Olmes this month delivered his fifth major lecture of the term at the University of St. Peerigrad. His subject, the most recent encyclical issued by His Holiness Uriah IV, Peerimagnus Infallibilitum, has already received wide circulation in church circles. Among those present in the audience were: Eminence Lorenzo Cardinal Peerricelli, Eminence Jose Cardinal Peerricelli, Dr. James Turnpike, former Episcopalian Bishop of California, and the Right Reverend John Philip Heisenstein, Pastor of Peery Memorial Cathedral in New York. The audience was filled with other noted clerics and religious leaders who had gathered to discuss the significance of the newest 'Rome declaration. Breaking the title of the Encyclical into into its three parts: Peeri, magnus, and infallibilitum, Olmes discussed the nature of the

tri-partite Peery. Stressing first the majesty and glory of the name itself, then its greatness and finally its infallibility, Olmes predicted that the work would rank with such important doctrines as Luther's treatises, the famous Pacis in Terris, and Leo's famous encyclical on Church-Labor relations.

Olmes continually stressed the essential fundamentals of the Peery Doctrine: the need for continued moderation in all things, the righteousness of those inspired by the truth of his doctrine, the need for peace with firmness in domestic and foreign affairs, and the greatly increased demand for tolerance of opposition viewpoints in a world where there was only one certainty, that of Peery Infallibility. Olmes ended his discussion by quoting from the final passage of the work:

"That there is one Peery is certain. That there will only be one Peery is hoped. That there may be more than one Peery is blasphemy. There is one Peery, and he is without fault. For in Peery is love, and in love there is Peery. Without Peery there is no love."

TORONTO (DWE) William Christian, Chaplain of Ryerson College, today delivered a learned paper whose major thesis was that Peery is dead. Although ringed by a cordon of President Nelson negro guardsmen (known as blackguards), he was bodily ejected from the stage by irate students. Rumors that Christian was inspired to make his pronouncement by a multimillion dollar IIER grant have not been substantiated.

THE MYTH OF THE SUPPLY CENTER-YEAR RATING SYSTEM Some years ago, when diplomacy games were beginning to draw to a conclusion in ever mounting numbers, and a multitude of rating system proposals were clouding the air, John Boardman printed in Graustark (at the time practically the only magazine with a lettercolumn, and thus naturally the one in which rating systems were being discussed) a set of supply center-year totals. These were simply the sums of year-end supply center holdings over all the years (save 1900) in completed games. (As a simple example, if Joe Backstab plays Italy very badly, and loses Venice in 1901 without gaining Tunis, loses Rome in 1902, and loses Naples in 1903, his line on a supply center chart would appear as 2 1 OUT, and his total for the game would be 3). Now, Boardman never claimed that supply center-year totals had any significance and validity as a rating system, or that they were especially significant... he merely presented them because he felt they might be interesting. I feel much the same.

As was pointed out in the discussion the arose after John printed his first center-year chart, a player who enters a large number of games -- even if he does poorly -- will amass a considerable total of center-years. He will not, of course, amass a total

anywhere near as great as a player who enters quite a few games as does very well in most of them. But still, there is something to the argument that perhaps average supply-centers per game should be considered.

It was also pointed out in those days that adoption of total center-years as a rating criterion would encourage players to prolong games, piling up huge center-year totals (it is this feature that Dave Lebling's mean rate of change system eliminates, by dividing net change in supply centers by the number of playing years over which the change occurs), but this gives some weight to the desirability of a listing of average center-years per year.

Boardman, however, in his listing presented only the results of completed games. John McCallum noted at the time, and again last week (Brobdingnag 76, p. 7), that the advantageous feature of a listing based on supply center years was that it could be made completely current. The data from all games in progress could be incorporated into such a listing, and it would be as current as the most recent Fall move in each game (in some cases, that's pretty stale). The

advantage of such current reliability is apparent when the center-year listing is compared to the (features of) the excellent McCallum rating system. With the current game list, as published in Brobd, negative scores from eliminations enter the lists immediately, but the system makes no distinction between the survivors in a game in progress... the player with 16 centers gets only as many points as the player with 1.

In presenting such a current center-year total listing, however, it must be remembered that while the number of games that contribute to a player's score is of some significance (obvious, a player in 15 games should pick up points faster than a player in 3), no average center-years per year figure can be calculated, since until games are completed this has no significance. A listing of all players' total center-year scores would take up much too much space, and as it is not my major interest here, I present above the totals for the top 25 players. A score of "500/7" means that as of my most recent receipts of diplomacy zines, the player has 500 center-years, and receives points from 7 different games. An asterisk after a player's name indicates that he is currently receiving center-year points from no games, and is thus -- to all intents and purposes -- inactive.

Now, it will be obvious that those who rank highest on this list do so -- at least partially -- by virtue of having been around the postal diplomacy scene for a long time, and having played in a large number of games. For this reason I do not consider the above listing to be of more than passing interest. Above all, it is not to

be considered a rating system, anymore than baseball players are rated solely on total RBI's. There is an alarming tendency among some players and gamesmasters to assume that any statistic can be construed as constituting a valid rating system. Now, I regard most statistics, including the ones presented in this section, as being of interest and as presenting information from which conclusions can be derived about the game, player behavior, etc. I am not naive enough to assume that the list on page 10 provides a valid ranking, either in an ordinal sense (John Koning is better than John Smythe because he has a higher total) or a cardinal one ("John McCallum is twice as good a player as Roland Tzudiker because his score is twice as large.") I just think it might make interesting reading.

Of somewhat more value than a simple total is the listing which follows, giving average supply center-years per year (obviously obtained by dividing the center-year total by the number of years for which the total is summed). As above, an asterisk indicates that the player is no longer active in postal diplomacy play. Again, if this were to be used as a rating system it would not be of great significance. It is obviously better to have played in one game and done very well (Dian and Bruce Pelz, for instance), than to have played in many games and done moderately well (Charles Brannan, Roland Tzudiker). Moreover, it is possible to boost your score considerably on this list by getting 16 or 17 centers and just sitting there, building up your average. It will be obvious that averages will lie between 1 and 17, and to rank highly on this list, it is in the interests of a player, once losing, to get out of the game as fast as possible. Check the position of, for instance, Ron Bounds and Jack Harness, who existed in games for years with one center.
