sTab, a tri-weekly journal of postal diplomacy, is produced at various addresses about the state by John Koning. Subscriptions are at the rate of 10 issues for \$1 (on which I lose money), and trades with other postal diplomacy magazines are most welcome.

As you note above, I am in Youngstown only on Weekends. What this means is that while you can send your moves to Youngstown, you will have to send retreats, etc., due in mid-week to my Louisville address. Also, editors of magazines in which I am a player would be well advised to send their magazines to me in Louisville... in some games I can't afford a five day delay before I get the moves.

Deadlines: sTab hereby establishes its official policy on deadlines:

Moves are due on the deadline date, which will almost
without exception (in fact, read "always") fall on a Friday. If by
Saturday, however, I have not printed up the issue, I will accept
moves arriving in the Saturday mail delivery (while it lasts) or by
phone. After the magazine is printed on Saturday I will accept no
moves. After Saturday night I will accept no moves, whether the magazine is printed or not. ## All of this arise primarily from the fact
that I have agreements with many players to call them collect if
their moves have not arived by deadline time, but in actuality I often don't get around to calling them until Saturday. Now, if I call
players are take moves on the day after the deadline, it logically
follows that I must accept moves arriving by post or phone on that
same day. Therefore, while I will accept moves one day late (if the
magazine is not run off) as a convenience to myself, players take a
chance if they depend upon getting moves in late. I sometimes stencil the issue Friday night, and run it off Saturday morning. If so,
tough luck. ## In any case, I thought you should all be warned of
my eccentricities concerning deadlines. (Note that moves sent to
Louisville cannot reach me on Saturday.)

Oh... one final note in regard to my Lcuisville address. If you call me there and cannot reach me, please do not give my landlandy any messages for me (except perhaps, " called and wants you to call back."), and especially don't give her any moves. She already suspects me of arcane practices.

and announced several additional appointments to the faculty:

Professor of Peerislavic Studies: Dr. Vytas Dukas; Professor of Greeneclogical Studies: Dr. Doug "Bang-Bang" Lulu; Professor of Mechanical Engineering: Dr. Harold Naus.

For the first time in seventy-two years the College had admitted an undergraduate student. The student, Jacque "The Rack" Greene, is transferring from Walla Walla Junior College with the approval of College authorities. Greene will be the subject of a number of studies and experiments conducted by the College's famous Institute of Sexual Studies, under the directorship of Dr. Ian McKinsley and Dr. Minos Generales (P.D. University of Athens, 1901). Just what the content and nature of those studies and experiments will be depends on how long the game lasts. However, Dr. McKinsley did announce the Institute had ordered ten thousand blue mini-towels, four hundred square yards of greene and blue paisley flannel, six Mustangs done in baby blue, and three sets of barbells.

Dr. John B. Bourke will deliver the first lecture of the season next issue on "THE INFLUENCE OF SCOTCH WHICKEY OF THE PRINKIPO CONFERENCE." This should be a high-light of the academic year and may surpass Dr. Bourke's Peery Prize-winning lecture "ON TIM USE OF OLD GRAUSTARKS AS A STUDY TOOL FOR THE PRE-LINLIGHTENMENT STUDY OF BARBARIAN TRIBES OF BROOKLYN."

ST. PEERIGRAD (17 March 1908) Her Imperial Majesty the Empress announced today that Russia had concluded a series of treaties and protocols with a variety of nations establishing a GREATER PEERIAN PEACE AND CO-PROSPERITY SPHERE. Signing a variety of documents in the Kremlin were: His Excellency Mohammed Didi Ist of the Maldive Islands; Signor Illustrio Magnifici of San Marino; Jose Juan Flencaciano of Andorra; and Nattie Bumpo of the Five Tribes Confederation of North America. The Pact is expected to make Russia the world's strongest power, as well as giving her complete control of the affairs of Periland; Tyler, Texas; Pasadena, California; and Youngstown, Ohio.

INTERNATIONAL PEERIPORT (2 February 1908) Gen. Keith "Red Dog" Polanski and Dr. Werner von Peerinut, Directors of the International Peeriport today announced that Earth's first mission into the more distant reaches of cuter space had been successful with the landing of WHOOPELE DOO Ist Peritune. After a six month journey of more than 300 million miles the craft reached its target exactly on schedule. Aboard the craft were Command Pilot Derek Nelson, Navigator John Koning, and Chief Brewer Robert Lake. By direction of Premier Levi Eskibibble of Perilland all three men have been awarded Periland's highest decoration: The Greene Badge of Courage. Peericentral has released the following recording of the actual landing on Peeritune:

NELSON: "That damn fool. If I've told him once, I've told him a hundred times: Look before you pull."

NLLSON: "You want to?"

KONING: "It's easier than filling out the reports on what happened to him."

NELSON: "Right."

"Help... hey, wait a minute." LAKE:

"What's the matter? Forget your parachute?" NELSON:

"This isn't so bad. It's kind of nice. Cheee... the LAKE: first man of Peeritune ... whocopoowwweeeee."

"What's it like?" KONING:

"Not bad, if you like bright colors. The ski is bright LAKE: Greene with blue streaks and clouds. The surface is kind of a s---y brown, like old Graustarks. There are hills, and the whole surface is covered with large blocks of shinning stuff. They are all different colors: blue, red, yellow, greene, and even a few pink ones. Funny, they don't seem to be anything. Just large blocks.

There are two kinds though. Large tall skinny ones and shorton fat ones. They've got four sides, but they are kind of rounded off so they aren't really square."

NELSON: "Can you tell what they are for?..."

LAKE: "Not really, but I'll go closer and see..."

(Later)

LAKE: "Commander?"

NELSON: "Yes?"

"I'm here." LAKE:

NELSON: "Yes, so what? What do you see?"

"Well... (in a quiet, subdued, emotional tone). I don't really believe it...."

KONING: "What are they?"

"They are definitely large blocks and appear to be some kind of monuments. They are about 200 feet high and 50 or 100 feet wide. They are mostly the same except for the carving on them..." NELSON: "What kind of carving?"

"Some kind of inscription. I can't really read it. locks like ancient Peerimaic to me but I can't read it."

NELSON: "Flash some of it up on your Peeriscanner."

"Here's one. It's red and one of the shorter ones. is pretty well battered and cracked all along one side. Even a corner is knocked off. Across the top it reads: 'C-O-N-R-A-D..' Got that?"

NELSON: "Yea, go on."

"'V-O-N...M-E-T-Z-K-E."

NELSON: "Hmmmmm? Wonder what that means?"

KONING: "Why don't we feed it into our super-Turnervac? If its known to human knowledge that will tell us."

NEISON: "Good idea. Go ahead." LAKE: "There's more, commander." HELSON: "Let's have it."

"Below that there's this: 'C-O-S-T-A...' and then it fades away. Below that is: '1(\$%-@)%'and then a long list of letters and numbers:  $\phi \phi D$ ,  $\phi \phi 0$ ,  $\phi \phi 45$ ,  $\phi \phi 0$ , a whole list. It's funny but they all have lines drawn through them. At the bottom it says: 'CHI SPIEGAR PUO IL MIO CORDOGLIO?' Wonder what that means? Oh yea, at the very bottom it says: 'SIC TRANSIT PEERISITES.'"

NFLSON: "Very strange."

KCNING: "Commander, the Turnervac has a read-out." NELSON: "What?"

KONING: "Does not compute. "

NELSON: "Great"

KONING: "It's a start."

NELSON: "Can you read any more?"

LAKE: "Yea, there's one over here. It's sort of like the other one except that it's greene and blue. There's a large picture of a dog on it, looks like it's dancing. Must be one of their gods ... And beneath it says: 'D-I-S-T-I-N-G-U-I-S-H-E-D C-O-M-B-A-T H-E-R-0.

"Here's another one. This is a big one. At the top it says 'E-R-I-C P-L-A-K-E' and beneath that there is a big looped circle with a period under it, sort of like a question mark. Under that there is a circle with three lines meeting in the center and dividing it into three parts."

LAKE: "And this one is sure funny. It's got the longest list of all and it's got a picture of a bunch of stringy lines, sort of like noodles. Strange... and at the top: 'P-E-G-G-Y?'

"This one is blue and skinnier than the rest. Not much on it except'L-O-S-T T-O P-E-E-R-I F-I-R-E....

NELSON: "Well, we'll feed it all into the Turnervac."

LAKE: "Commander?"

NELSON: "Yes?"

LAKE: "It sounds sort of strange, but I feel like I'm in a graveyard, the way it's so quiet, and everything so peaceful and calm. It's as if this whole planet were a big graveyard for bigger-than-people people. Sort of like Valhalla was supposed to be, I think..."

NELSON: "We'll feed that in too."

KONING: "Commander. Turnervac is turned on! It's got a feedout."

QUOTE: "PEERITUNE IS BELIEVED TO BE THE LEGENDARY HOME OF A GROUP OF SUPER-HEROES FROM EARLIER EARTH MYTHOLOGY, DATING FROM THE EARLY 1900's. ALTHOUGH NO PROOF HAS EXISTED UNTIL THIS TIME IT IS RECORDED IN THE PEERISTIC PAPERS THAT FOLLOWING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A WORLD-WIDE PEERIOCRACY IN 1923, THOUSANDS OF EARTHLINGS FLED THE PLANET TAKING WITH THEM THEIR WAR DEAD TO BE BURIED IN ANOTHER UNCONTAMINATED PLACE. James W. Latimer III Merrimack College Austin Centre, Room 314 No. Andover, Mass. 01845 PIEDMONT "It's a trap, It's a trap, we'll be sufficiated by the stench," chanted long lines of flyboys as the Italian Airforce enplaned for Peerigrad.

FROM THE ISENZO RIVER SECTOR: The massive Austrian and Italian Fall offensives have been crushed. The Austrians'drive on Venice shattered on the seemingly impregnable fortress surrounding the ancient city of the Doges. Again casualties are very low, 2 killed (one by drowning while swimming at a local spa and another when bitten by a dog) and 39 injured. When the High Command was questioned about the losses, one General (whose name will not be given) replied, "The men are well aware of the sophistication of the Italian defenses protecting Venice, as are the Italians. So neither side will waste men and material to contest the neutral area between the Isonzo and Venice. Twice a year we march to Venice, and twice a year we march back. Everyone enjoys the scenery and the exercise. Besides, the Italian merchants and local female entrepreneurs do a booming tourist business. The five hundred thousand soldiers we employ can make a sizable contribution to their local economy."

In Tyrolia the fighting was more severe. On the snow covered slopes of the Austrian Alps four Italian soldiers were killed in various ski contests, while numerous others were injured. No Austrian losses were reported as the Austrian Army again beat the finest Italian winter athletes 402 to 69. All the gold and silver medals for heroism were captures by the Austrians' superb performance. The Austrian High Command is looking forward to the next Italian offensive. Generals (again, names will be withheld) are most enthusiastic about Austria's chances for yet another victory. It seems the whole Austrian team will be returning since their enllstment has been extended due to the current national emergency.

A PIZZA ON THE ADRIATIC: The Naval Ministry just released a most astounding statement. The Austrians succeeded in winning the Annual Ionian Fishing Tournament. Since the Italians are justly famous for their prowess as catchers of fish, no one expected the Austrians to make a strong showing, let alone win the tournament. Congratulations to the brave sailors of Austria. The Fishing Fleet is expected to make port shortly.

VIENNA The Austrian Naval Ministry and the International Union of Fish Monters have offered to supply life jackets to the Italian sailers. As one union leader stated, "We cannot have those poor brave men going to a watery grave."

I suppose I sught to reply to the editorials in the last two issus of BIG BROTHER ((printed in sTab #53)), although I'd really rather be typing the Rules of Parlement.

This reply will be printed as is in the next issue of Lonely Mountain, together with any reply Reinsel wishes to make, and any

comments anyone else wishes to make.

First, I want to applogize for the intemperate language of the letter that was printed in STAB ((#52)). It serves no purpose. The editorial in LM #43 presents my position much more coherently. ((exceppts from said editorial appear in sTab #53.))

Now here are some points I wish to make concerning Reinsel's editorials:

(1) Neither the letter nor the editorial was an attempt to make "Moralistic excuses" for my ruining the Winnter's Gamo. I take the entire blame for that, as I said.

(2) Although I share the blame for ruining the Gamesmaster's Game, so do four of the other six players who also missed three

moves. ((Brannan, Bounds, Chalker, von Metzke))

(3) It is true that Reinsel warned us a long time ago about sending telegrams to Clarion, a fact which I had forgotten when I wrote the letter and which I corrected in the editorial. I do not understand why Reinsel jumps to the conclusion that I was lying, when he is perfectly aware that I am forgetful (in fact he says so himself).

(4) It is an exaggeration to say I take weeks or months to get a move out. I rarely take more than 10 days. Once, in 1965P, I postponed the game for several months, telling all the players that I was going so, because of a terrible personal tragedy of one of the

players. I would do the same for Charles Reinsel.

(5) It is also true that Reinsel announced the rule about publishing early if all the moves are in early at the beginning of his first game. I had also forgotten this. Again, I was not deliberately lying, and I corrected my statement in the editorial.

(6) It is true that I, too, will publish moves early if I get them early. However, my players have an out not open to Reinsel's players: if they mark a move "tentative" I will wait out the dead-

line.

(7) In Reinsel's games, if you miss three moves <u>during the course of a game</u>, your units hold thereafter, no matter how many there are. In my games, if you miss two moves <u>within two years</u> you are replaced by another player. It seems obvious to me that, contrary to what Reinsel says, my rule is MUCH less stringent than his, and, more important, distorts the game less. (Not that I'm entirely happy with my rule -- I intend to use McCallum's system in future games.)

(8) I do indeed accept moves after the deadline if I haven't typed the game up yet. From anyone, without playing favorites. Reinsel evidently thinks this is immeral. It's a free country.

(9) Every time I make Charles Reinsel mad he repeats that (true) story about me claiming to have mailed him some moves which (we discovered while he was here one day) were sitting on my dresser all the time. I think I had better pull another stupid trick so you people can read a new story. What has it to do with my critique of his postal rules?

(10) Reinsel quotes me as saying his rating system is the best. Well, I still think so. Neither in the letter nor in the editorial

did I criticize his rating system.

(11) I am quite aware that adopting my recommendation that those BB games in which large numbers of units are in civil disorder be stricken from the rating lists would improve my own ratings under any rating system I am aware of (more with some than with others). ((It would also provide a means whereby any player losing a game in a magazine without a replacement player policy could bar that game from the rating lists.)) I said so in my editorial. This

means that in the interest of Morality, Fair Play, or what have you, that I should not push for or campaign for my own recommenda -. . tich, and I'm not going to.

(12) I never "insisted" that Clarion, Pa., was 350 miles from

Cleveland. Read my editorial again.
(13) I do not break rules which have a purpose. You won't find me bribing or lying to Gamesmasters or poking the pieces around on the board when no one is looking, because they would ruin the game for no purpose, and because people would not want to play with me

again. I am not a poor sport.

(14) I think the Boardman-Blake hoax was neat, although I am aware that he ruined a postal game in the process. If I had been another player in the game I would have thought that being so thoroughly fooled was great fun and worth ruining the game. I have since come to find out, however, that many players take game-playing much more seriously than that. I now would not pull a stunt like Beardman pulled because I know this about games players. (I do not play any games except Diplomacy, except a little Hearts, and until I became a Diplomacy player I did not know any serious games hobby= ists and was not aware of how big a part of their lives their games were.)

(15) I am a pretty good math teacher.

opposition (in Brob) to the failure to replace people who drop a country. In Xenogogic X-1, England and Turkey are in a close endgame battle. However, England would have won easily if not for the fact that Austria dropped out with about five pieces and was never replaced, permitting Turkey to roll through the Balkans unimpeded. Obviously, it was unfair to penalize England for Austria's drop out

(I'm England, naturally).

I think it's very bad practice to accept late moves, unless they are postmarked before the deadline. In New York, we frequently call each other up after the deadline and tell our "enemy" our moves. This would be disastrous if he could still make a phone call and change them. ((Then obviously, if you are playing in a magazine that is known to accept moves after the deadline -- like IM, Erehwon or sTab -- it is necessary for you to practice restraint and not call up your enemy and tell him your moves. That seems an easier solution than rearranging the practices of many gamesmasters.))

As a tournament bridge player, the comment praising the master point system really got my goat. The master point system is a commercial gimmick to make incompetent bridge players think they've achieved something. There are six different rankings, the highest being life master. The analogy would be if there were six different

educational degrees, the highest being high school graduate.

Master points are awarded for doing well in tournaments, but you don't lose any for playing and doing badly. The result is that the more you play, and the older you are, the more master points you To be a life master you need 300 points. There are 10,000 bridge players in that category, most of whom I would catagorize as ho pelessly incompetent. The idea is that any palocka who plays bridge long enough can get 300 points, at which time the bridge

league makes a big fuss over him, so the duffer is encouraged to spend hundreds of dollars at local clubs to get the points.

(Incidentally, this isn't sour grapes, since I have about 1200 points myself. Tom Griffin has about the same, and John Beshara, who is equally good but plays a lot less, has about half that.)
