EXPLANATIONS This issue of stab is, I realize, a little late (it was due out 15 August 1970), and I suppose you are all expecting some fanciful explanation of the delay. So, I'll provide one... or even several.

The weekend that sTab #65 was due out I went to Clarion, Pennsylvania, and spent an enjoyable two days losing an incredible variety of games to Charles Reinsel. When I returned from Clarion I discovered that a number of moves had not arrived... a large number. Rather than go to press with so many blank spaces I resolved to wait a week or so and see what would come in. That was a mistake.

First, finals week at Youngstown State, where I teach part-time, name ip, and then high school (where I teach full-time) began.

During the school year I pursued a rather strenuous schedule. Each Monday morning I would drive to Canton, Ohio, some 50 miles away, and ceach high school. That night I would prepare my college lectures in small room I rented there. Tuesday I would teach in Canton, then drive back to Youngstown to teach a night class at YSU. Wednesday back to Janton, then back to Youngstown for another night class. Ditto Thursday. Friday, after school, I would drive to Cleveland where I would visit this interesting little... but that is another story for smother time. I would, in any case, get home on Saturday afternoon or evening and immediately begin either preparing for the next week's classes or go to sleep. I would also mention here that as advisor to the high school newspaper and yearbook I had little free time during the school day, and gave up what was left of my weekend about every mird week to work with my students on publications.

Now, teaching full-time in high school and in addition teaching what is at some colleges a full-time load (9 hours), driving nearly 1000 miles a week, etc., takes a lot out of one. Added to this were the deaths of several members of my family ever the Christmas helidays when I had planned to publish this issue, the virtual disintegration of my mimeo, the death of another family member (none of them in the immediately family, thank god) in the spring, and a number of other problems that I fo now plan to go into here. Anyway, things got rather messed up/ In addition, the missing moves never did come in -- to my knowledge (I didn't open diplomacy mail for many months, and some may have been lost),

I should have turned the games over to other, willing hands (of which there were many... thanks), but I am to stubborn to do that. I'm sorry. Now, however, is the time for recovery. stab should come out on a regular schedule for the foreseeable future, but there will have to be a period of adjustment at the beginning. Jone players have bery probably vanished... others have noved. Rather than print games with a lot of missing moves, I have chosen (with the exception of the Trantor games, which were complete last August) to summarize piece positions and supply center holdings for all games and call for moves. I have, in each case, noted whose moves are still missing, but any player is entitled to submit new moves if he wishes. The next issue of stab is scheduled for a month after this rather abbreviated one. I hope that in that time all vacancies can be at least discovered and perhaps filled and we can get underway again. I know many of you are justafiably impatient.

A roster of players is presented with each game, for the convenience of those of you who have forgotten addresses. Would you please check over these rosters and let me know of any address changes (there may be many)? Also, those of you who are subscribers and who have moved will find this issue forwarded to you (I hope). Please let me know before the next deadline if you have changed addresses. I will try to make future issues of sTab worth any trouble you may be put to to get hold of them.

Finally, since I know there will have been some disappearances among players, I am looking for substitutes (no cost to you). If you are willing to take over a prosition, please let me know.

Oh, yes... I plan to make the 4th of July DIPCON III in Oklahoma... see some of you there?

your zine on American monarchies is very intesting. Walker has some good points; however, there is one I must take exception to. In my opinion, George III's heirs are not heirs to an American throne. As Pod himself said, "...the people of a nation are the only judge of legitimacy, and the principle of legitimacy is whatever the law says it is." Therefore, in my view, George III was declared "lilegitimate" (as King, of course) by the American people with the signing of the Declaration of Independence.

Linden had an excellent point for those wishing to set up a bingtom in the U.S., and that is his suggestion that we "royalize" one of the Baltimore Bonapartes, there being a native family and all that. ((John Boardman says they are all dead, however — sTab #64 — putting us in the literal position of trying to "dig up" a king for the US.)) I submit that the Baltimore guys are not as deserving as perhaps the Kennedys are, who probably all thing this country has even had

thing this country has ever had to royalty. My candidate for any King job is Teddy Kennedy. ((This was written 14 July 1969.)) The fact that his brother was "monarch" of the USA gives his claim more strength.

I seriously think that America would be better off if we had a constitutional monarchy like Great Britain's. The King could take care of all the entertaining chores of the President, and the prime minister would be left to devote all his energies to affairs of state. It wouldn't take much to do this; just a few changes in the Constitution. The real chore would be in changing the attitudes of the people towards an American Royal House.

Rod Walker's argument that the "Estates" of a nation have the right to dispose of its crown is certainly valid; there have been numerous circumstances under which representatives of a nation have sat in solern conclave and changed the terms under which the crown may be inherited. (Perhaps the most recent example of this was the Danish referendum which repealed the Salic Law in that country, making Princess Margaret rather than her uncle Frince Knud the heir to her father King Frederik IX.) But if a disinherited line exists under the terms of such a change, they can always put up a howl about the sacred character of monarchic inheritance - as the Jacobites did in Great Britain, or the Carlists in Spain.

As far as I know, succession in France has always been through the male line since Hugh Capet seized the throne about a thousand years ago. Presumably the situation Rod mentions ("in which the succession did pass through the famale line when direct male succession was impossible") took place earlier. The Capet male line is most unusual among royal dynasties, in that the male succession has never failed. The direct, Valois, and Bourbon lines have died out, and the Bourbon-Spain line (also called "Bourbon-Anjou") is of dubicus legitimacy, but the Bourbon-Parma and Bourbon-Orleans lines are still going strong. The youngest line, Bourbon-Condé, terminated in the Duke of Enghien executed under the orders of Napoleon I, in one of the classic cases of misapprehension of circumstantial evidence.
