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SAINT GEORGE SPEAKS

A Digression



As regular readers and subbers may have suspected, I am interested in monsters. But, unsurprisingly to my mind, I do not go to the movies to watch any of the new monster films, nor do I watch them on television.

There is something lacking in Godzilla. A jet-propelled turtle such as Gamera is merely laughable. Perhaps with time, the television studios or the movies will create a new monster worthy of the name, but with the possible exception of King Kong, which did not interest me, they haven't done it yet.

The really exceptional monsters, the ones that strike a chord somewhere within us, turn up again and again in literature: the Gorgon, Cyclops, the Sphinx. Those were mythic creations which appeared again and again and built up a body of tradition.

Recent times have yielded two more monsters, one of which doesn't have too much appeal in my mind, the Werewolf. The lycanthrope of various guises pervades much a modern fantasy literature. The other has much fascination. I am speaking of course of the Vampire.

The Vampire, unlike the other monsters, is an attractive creature. In fact, it is only recently that modern authors and screenwriters are beginning to appreciate the erotic attraction of the Vampire.

Anne Rice's Interview with the Vampire is a skillful combination of attraction and repulsion. There is a sincere attempt to understand the Vampire's situation. What it means to be undead and undying. The Vampire attempts to satisfy his blood lust with animals, but comes to the realization that the choosing of a victim, and the draining of her blood, is more than an act of hunger. The story is so well done that I hesitate to describe any more of it lest I spoil it for you. If you have any interest in the horror genre, I suggest you read this book, even if you don't normally read fantasy...neither do I.

And of course this is leading up to something else. PBS has recently broadcast a new version of Dracula. The book, by Bram Stoker, is excellent and has lost none of its power. The same can't be said for Frankenstein. I have seen Dracula played by four gentlemen: Bela Lugosi, Lon Chaney, Jack Palance, and the latest, Louis Jourdan. And surprise, surprise! Louis Jourdan is the best I have seen. (Prior to him it was Palance). PBS took three hours to present the show. It was shown here at 1:00 AM-4:00 am. I have heard the objection that Dracula was seen too many times standing in what appeared to be broad daylight (I maintain it was dawn). The objection proves my essential thesis.

Everyone knows that Vampires can't go out in the daylight, they're afraid of garlic; they cast no reflections in mirrors. (there's a good scene in Jourdan's Dracula in which he picks up a mirror and passes his hand over it to no effect) A whole body of tradition has built up about the Vampire, and each new story must take this into account. Anne Rice's book even explains why not every victim becomes a vampire.

A good monster is an enjoyable thing, a mixture of fear and attraction. Why can't Hollywood or television give us monsters like these instead of the latest dreadful, The Incredible Melting Man. (Incredible is right)

Budapest: There was much weeping in the streets when the mobilization orders for Austrian 6th Army were announced. The cream of Austria's motherhood streamed from the kitchens, the nurseries and the bedrooms to protect it with abusive language not heard since the inception of the war.

"You fat toads", "Government bureaucracy", "Incipient Fascist wife-beaters," and "Recessive homosexual civil servants" were just some of these phrases. The ministry of defense found all its exits blocked with infants, with notes like "You want these as well?" and "You want 'em, you can have 'em," attached to them. They have become quite an embarrassment, as Italian ambassadors have had to repeat things three times before they could be understood over the bawling. The Minister has threatened to call in riot police if the crowd has not dispersed by midnight.

Berlin: REPORT TO THE KAISER

Recent intelligence presents a balanced picture of the diplomatic style of the Austrian leader. He characterizes Diplomacy as "the place for good dirty fun." (emphasis added) While the Kaiser considers himself a noble ally of the Austrian, it should be noted that the Austrian feels that "noble allies...is not a playing style I would recommend without reservation." He underscores this stating that "nobility does not always cut it." We must conclude that this was intended as a veiled warning to His Kaisership, as his name has appeared recently in the same zine (Fol Si Pie) as the above information appeared.

If this appears necessary that certain defensive measures not inconsistent with the recent concord be taken. Specifically, units must be ordered to Ukraina and St.Petersburg. As neither issue was raised.

in the recent discussion, it must be assumed that such moves are not unacceptable. Whether the continuing presence will be allowed in the Ukraine is another matter entirely, and it seems likely that an insistence on its removal in the Fall will be forthcoming. It is further recommended that all obligations made by the Kaiser in that meeting be kept, in accordance with accepted procedures.

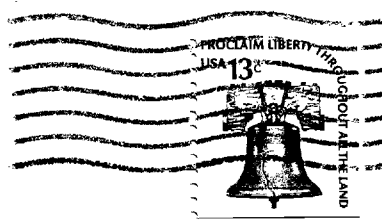
