## odds and ends

The big topic of discussion in the hobby today(other than the weather) seems to be the fact that Diplomacy World is no longer going to carry the "Need a Game" listing. Their ostensible reason seems to be, and it's not really clear just what the reason is, is they intend to emphasize the FTF aspects of play, on the theory that FTF play is what continually generates sales, and the postal hobby already has its sets and thus is

no longer a source of revenue.

I seriously doubt whether there are people out there who are going to buy Diplomacy sets because they have read Diplomacy World. The other is more likely - that players will buy Diplomacy World because they have bought sets. But DW has, til now, provided the bulk of the contact between the FTF players who might want to get into postal play and the postal hobby. The editors of DW claim there is a vast number of players to whom diplomacy is a game to play a couple of times a year.

That is the market they are aiming at.

I question whether those people are going to want to continually buy a magazine that only deals with a game they only play occasionally. AND there will be no means in DW to get in touch with the postal hobby should the player be so inclined. I think DW's new policy is going to separate the two branches of the hobby even further, and unless we, the members of the postal hobby figure some way of reaching the new FTF players, I would say the postal hobby will eventually disappear. Unless the new players re-invent it for themselves.

A word to novices: I notice a lot of you (and a lot of experienced players who should know better) rely on the USPS to do a reasonably efficient job of delivering the mail. HAH : While the USPS doesn't often lose a letter, it doesn't consider there is any hurry. It figures that if you were in a hurry you would have used the phone. So if it takes 4 or 5 days to deliver a letter to the next state, so what. How hard do you expect someone to work for only 16,000 dollars a year? My advice, and I strongly urge you to accept it, is to send in orders as soon as you receive the zine. You must have some idea of what you want to try to do. You can always change your moves later, after you have talked to your ally. It's easier to explain why you didn't change your moves than it is to explain why you didn't move at all.

Battlestar Galactica looks like it should be a good show. It's a pity ABC scheduled it opposite Mary Tyler Moore's show. Fortunately, I have RCA's video tape recorder, so I'll be able to watch both, but it is ominous for the ratings. I would suggest you watch Battlestar the first time without waiting for reruns. SF doesn't do well on TV under any circumstances, so there may not be a rerun, no matter how good the show is.

The British ambassador, who was so warmly received only last month by the Archduke's third cousin Kristina, was reported by a reliable source to have been spreading doubts in diplomatic circles in this Austrian city about the good intentions of Franz Joseph's newest treaty partner. When pressed by the emperor's advisors as to the sources of his information, the ambassador is reported to have refused to reveal them, indicating only that they were "trustworthy".

There have been reports that the British ambassador has been known to frequent the Gasthaus am Neuberg, a locale frequented by TurkisH Gast-

arbeiter.

Meanwhile, the Archduke is vacationing in Salzburg, where he has been trying without success to establish diplomatic contact with Kaiser Wilhelm. The Archduke had planned a conference in the historic city of Traunstein, where the Kaiser was scheduled to vacation, but the Kaiser's busy schedule did not permit him to leave his mansion in Brandenburg.
