England (Lee Kendter, Jr.) When this game started I was hoping to form and English-German alliance, but after hearing from the German player I knew this was hopeless. He had no intention of owrking with me or Russia. After Winter 1901, Dave and I agreed to form an alliance against Germany. The alliance was fine until Russia stabbed me in 1904. That same turn the Austrian stabbed Russia, something I suspected was going to happen, and that was the only reason I wasn't in too bad of shape. While I lost three centers, Russia only picked up one, and this had to be built down south. At this point I knew I had no chance to win. I then tried to form an alliance against the Russian only to be stabbed by the Italian. At this point I was sure the game was hopeless and went after the Italian for his stab. I felt I could held on at three centers for a long time, which I did, and I was still able to continue harassing the Italians to the end of the game. The possibilities were there to even take more Italian centers had the game not ended. Congratulations to Dave Ditter who played a fine game.

Austria (Eric Verheidem) This game was dominated by the relationship between Russia, Austria, and Italy. Caught in the middle and offerred alliances by both sides, I accepted the alliance from Italy and stabbed Russia. I did this mainly for strategic reasons, however did not count on Italian stupidity. Smith pulled back from easy gains in the west and spent his time battering fleets against Austrian shores. He got all the way to Trieste by the end of the game. On my end, I simply threw everything against the Italian and advised the Russian that I would not defend the rear. I've done this a number of time in similar situations and nine

times out of ter, I can drag the attacker down with me.

Congratulations are certainly due to Dave Ditter, particularly if he suckered Smith into attacking me. I think he would have been out of it

if the alliance had held.

Russia(Dave Ditter, Winner) Overall, considering that this game began early in 1976 and ended just now im May, 1979 it was indeed frustrating. I am a strong advocate of tarring and feathering (so-called) hobby GM's. That is, those GM's who publish at their convenience.

As it turns out a 1907 win is a quick, unexpected one. Much thanks to Roy Smith who got this game going again in SG&D. It was a great pleasure

to play with Lee, Jr., Bill, Steve, Roy & Bric.

France(Lee Kendter, Jr.) There is not much to say about this game. After Austria missed his moves in Fall, 1901, the Italians and Russians had a definite advantage, which allowed Russia to wir. I saw this possibility in 1901, but England and Germany were not willing to fight the east. Later in the game, I managed to get the German to work with me, only to have him stab me later. I knew by then the game was a Russian wim. I felt this was a porrly played game. The lack of co-operation by the western powers gave the game to the east. Why the German stabbed me still does not make any sense, and I hope his end game statement may give me a clue.

Turkey(George Pyfrom) I thought the temporary alliance I had with Russia would not hold. Although we had the stand-off, I was suspicious of him. When Aus wrote me to join him, I passed this (Continued on page 10)

COMMENTARY - Ledder

In the East, there is what appears to be a standard two-on-one with Turkey on the receiving end. Russia has not played as aggressive a move as he could have, which may mean that he is uncertain about the intentions of England and Germany. The moves in the West indicate a real basis for sucj Russian fears. Germany and France are obviously allied, and Germany seems to be headed for Scandinavia. A German move to Scandinavia and an Italian move against Austria would relieve some of the pressure on Turkey?

France is the player who seems to be having the most diplomatic success, and it is he who will in large measure direct the course of the game. Everyone has moved away from France, whose move leaves his imtention in doubt. France and Germany could be attacking England, but then why give England a chance to take Belgium? France's move seems more useful as an attack on Italy. Had the Italianmoved to Piedmont, France would have been in position to hold Spaim and Portugal without jeepardizing Marseilles' build apportunity by directing both armies to Marseilles(unless Italy played A PIE S French A spa-MARI) If France is attacking Italy, he can now play his fleet to Western Med while securing two builds with his armies. The Eastern players should thus be waryof a possible Western Triple Alliance.

It is Italy who has the most difficult decision to make in the fall. He can attack either Vienna or Trieste and he has the option of trying for Greece, if Turkey will support him. Such an attack would guarantee Italy at least one build while preventing Austria from getting more than one. But in attacking Austria, he'll have to trust France not to attack him. A wiser decision might be to try for Munich, If successful, this attack will weaken the might of a Western Triple Alliance and give Italy two builds. At worst, Germany will have to use one of his armies for

defense instead of occupation of the low countries.

Next season, the relationship between Italy and France should be more clear, and we'll have a better idea of which countries will be successful

and which destroyed.

game statement. Lee GM's 1978IS; he does not play in it.)) COMMENTARY-Berch, Incipient Western Triple Puts Italy on the Spot.

There is evidence aplenty of a western (EFG) alliance. France's pulling his armies west toward Iberia is very pro-G and F bre-MAO plus nothing adjacent to Bel is very pro-B. Germany obliges both neighbors by floating his fleet in the Baltic, and England's I-trust-France A lvp-EDI completes the story. All is in readiness for F'O1, when France moves F mac-WES(or even convoys to NAF) against Italy, Germany stands R out of Swe, Eng convoys to Nwy and either takes Bel or delays that a bit to enter Bar or Ska. But that doesn't mean that F'01 will actually turn out that way, and E, F, & G are doubtless denying any such alliance to their other neighners, regardless of their true intnetions. For example, this could easily be a set-up of England, with France moving F mac-Iri/Nae and Germany moving to Denmark Holland and Belgium, leaving England in an inappropriate anti-R stance. Similar set-ups of F & G are possible, so you cannot conclude that the western triple is already operating until you see the F'01 moves.

One man badly needs to know this fact: Italy. In a well-played game of Diplomacy, a single misstep should doom a country, and Italy is in a position where any single move could be the fatal error. If he is to be attacked early by France, an extra build would be very handy but not necessarily essential. The line of F Tun, F Tyr, A Tus, A Ven/Ple can bottle up the French if an eastern fleet will ce-operate by providing an uncuttable support for Tunis. Gaining that center from Austria will embroil him in a war with Austria which won't be a quick one because Russia will be too busy in the North to help much. Taking a German center would seriously stall RFG, and possibly de-stabilize it, as E-F-I vs G would certainly look attractive to E & F. But if EFG stayed together, Italy would eventually lose his 5th center. This would allow Italy to remove an army, bringing him to 3F and 1A, which is stronger against F than 2A & 2F. He has a third alternative, viz. to try to take both Vie and Tri. This requires a gullible Austria, but has the virtue ofproviding enough builds for both stonewalling France and, with Turkey's help, finishing Austria off quickly. Italy's most complex option is to attack both G & A, on the theory that one of these attacks is bound to be correct and should give him the muscle to deal with the other attack's consequences. On the other hand, If Italy believes that there is no Western Triple, then the attack on G will not be prefitable unless G is being set up, and even then F & B may not tolerate for long Italy sharing the spoils. Under these circumstances, the attack on Austria is more appealing and less risky. This is especially true since T seems likely to be anti-A. The standoff in Bla is almost certainly pre-arranged, given the lack of army

The standoff in Bla is almost certainly pre-arranged, given the lack of army movement into Arm and Sev. Note that Russia provides no camouflage for the R-T alliance: doing A Mos-Sev would have produced the same board situation and obscured Russian intentions in this regard.

Italy's first order of business is thus to write B & F & see how they react to the proposal of A Tyo-Mun. As E, F & G are all experienced play

react to the proposal of A Tyo-Mun. As B, F & G are all experienced players, it is likely that if there is a western triple, they have concocted a cover story. Most likely X & Y will say: We're setting up Z. Z will either say: We're setting up X or Y, or Yes, there is a triple or will not respond. But who is selected as Z? If G was picked, E & F will be forced to tell Italy - go ahead & grab for Mun, forcing G to cover Mun. Which means (assuming F Gob-Swe) that G gets only one build. However, G may find this just too chancy. Antagonizing R, attacked by I and surrounded by strong & unhindered F & E & just get one build? I sure wouldn't like that. So G as Z(Geeze) would have been an unfortunate choice. But even if F or B were chosen as Z, he still has to tell his story about setting up someone and if that someone happens to have been G then the west has the same problem. The only cover story that would keep I out of the picture would be if both F & B say they are setting the other up with G supporting one of those tales. The upshot should be a good deal of lying. If I decides that there is a triple, but decides not to attack G, then he (continued pg)

## SAINT GEORGE SPEAKS

## Alien

If you are at all interested in SF, you must see this film. And not for the plot. Alien is the first film to convince me that the SF trappings are real. There isn't a lot that can be said about the plot for several reasons. One is that the plot is really that of a monster movie, not SF. And for non-SF buffs, I hear there are some of you-I must point out the two genre are different.

Second the film relies on genuine surprise for much of its impact.

And it has plenty of impact. For the final 3/4 of the film, the woman seated next to me watched the film from behind the inadequate protection of her purse. She held the purse in front of her eyes and muttered, "I can't believe I paid to see this." I can't believe she paid not to see it.

I don't recommend the movie for pre-teenagers, accompanied by parents or not. Of course I wouldn't have recommended "Jaws" to them either. I didn't even recommend "Jaws to myself. I don't like to see people eaten alive, although I seem to be seeing it a lot in movies lately.

But the strong drawing point of Alien is the sets. I simply don't see how they accomplished their effects. There is a scene in the alien spaceship which takes place in a gigantic room. I assume part of the back-ground had to be painted, but if so I couldn't detect it. Otherwise they have built fantastic sets. I sat open-mouthed at some of them. The 9.9 million was well spent.

The actors are also a cut above the run-of-the-mill cast. Some don't stay around to make much of a impression, but some, Sigurney Weaver, for example, take the events happening with deadly seriousness.

I don't think this will gross anywhere near what Stars Wars did because of the nature of the film. But I could be wrong. I don't usually like bloody movies, and I think I shall see this agaim. Good summer viewing.

must say that he will, so that G will cover Mun and lose a build. Even if he decides there isn't a triple, he still must say he's attacking G to provide cover for his attack on A. The reverse applies if he decides

to attack A.

I have gone into great & probably unnecessary detail about Italy, because so many players assume that if you don't have to care about the west. Not so, and this game is a good example.

A Mos H is a bit too tame for my taste. He must have been concerned about A Smy-Arm. Northern concerns would have dictated A mos-Stp/Lvn or A War H, A Mos-Ukr((Mark seems a bit confused: those were the Rumsian moves))
Some final words on the German opening. F Kie-Bal has the drawback that

it requires 2 units to take Den & deny R Swe, whereas F Kie-Den-Swe does it with one. And the fleet cannot be used in the west any time soon. On the other hand. if 1) he's not interested in Bel and 2) expects no hostile moves from F. E. I or A then he has a piece to spare. It has the major advantage that it blocks F Gob-Bal in S'02(but not F'01the, such a Russian move gives G an extra build). F Gob-Bal can severely crimp German options it happened to me in 761F & to my ally in 78H ! Second, it means that G can take Swe by force in S'02. The more conventional route requires either E help or the build of a second fleet or a S'02 guess to take Swe by F'02. Third, it provides for the possibility of the devastating, but easily overlooked convoy to Livonia. An army placed there in S'02 exposes StP, Mos & War.

Normally one would expect the best diplomatic atmosphere for this opening to be 1) E&F Mutually hostile, so that G can safely pursue an eastern adventure and 2) a Turkish or Austrian ally against R and 3) no problem with Italy. Apparently none of these 3 conditions exist. However a solid EFG alliance could be a decent substitute for point 1). And Austria is poised to stand Russia out of Rum. So G must pursuade I to attack A, while persuading A that I. won't attack A and keep T from helping R. It's a tall order.
