POSTAL DIPLOMACY TOURNAMENT

I have been approached with the idea of a postal Diplomacy tournament and I have agreed to organize it. I will not be playing in it, to ensure my strict neutrality. I want to have a large number of GM's who are willing to carry the games by carbon copy or Xerox. They will not be carried as part of any established zine. Players will pay an entry fee to buy the trophies, and a sub fee to cover the individual GM's cost of mailing. Obviously, the more GM's we have, the fewer games any one GM has to carry.

I do not wish to hear from players at this time. BUT. If you have been in the hobby for at least two years, with at least a year's experience in GM'ing(FTF does count), and you are willing to do carbon copy games for a period of two years, I need you for a tournament GM. Games will be run on a three-week deadline until 1906 and on a two-week deadline thereafter. Standbies will not be used. GM's will be allowed to play in the Tournament.

but obviously not in games they are GMing.

I think the failure of the previous attempt to have a postal tournament was in the lack of central organization. I am going to handle this for this tournament. But I can't undertake to run all the games. So if you are interested in making this a success, sign up with me now. If there is sufficient response from the hobby, we can begin to sign up players in about September, with the target of starting the Tournament in January, 1980. That should give us plenty of time to get organized.

GM's will be provided with a set of guidelines for GMing, and a uniform set of house rules, so all rulings can be made on the same basis. Steve McLendon, of <u>Dragon and the Lamb</u>, and Jerry Jones, of <u>Diplomacy World</u> & <u>LDNS</u>, have already agreed to be tournament GM's. Join them.

The Miniature Army:
A Personally Blended Piece of History

An army of miniatures marching down a road towards their tabletop foe can be a panoramic procession of splendor and pride to the owner of the troops and his fellow commanders. For only they know the time, expense, and research that went into the formation of those pieces of lead into a historical representation.

The building of a miniature army (or fleet, or armor corps) of any period takes time. First and foremost, the interest in a particular period of history of theme must be developed. This can range from anything like the Great Persian War of 490-480 B.C. all the way to a favorite Fantasy or Science Fiction series that you want to re-create on the tabletop. All of

these require research of one kind or another.

The next consideration is the purchase of the lead models that are going to represent your units. Any number of wargaming magazines or hobby shop can supply you with these. Scale is of major importance. For land armies, scales go from 9mm all the way up to 54mm. The smaller the scale, the more space and cost efficient the figures (more men for the dollar and more area to play on). However, with the small scales, detail is sacrificed so that you don't have the accuracy of the uniforms, etc. If this isn't important to you, buy small.

Ship miniatures range in scale from 1/1200 all the way down to 1/4800 for wargaming purposes and, as always, the smaller the ship, the less the price and detail. Tanks of WW I and II come anywhere from 1/36 to 1/285; planes

about the same.

For everything but naval miniatures army scale must also be considered. Do you want each figure to represent ten actual men? twenty? thirty? In many cases this is decided by the rules you are using. Some games, such as the <u>Dungeons and Dragons</u> role playing variety, have one figure per actual person in the game. Others can go as high as one to 200 or more depending on the number of figures you have and what you are trying to

Regardless of historical accuracy or organization, the real over-riding factor in building your miniature army is what you want. It's your creation. If you want to collect just destroyers of WW I, that's fine. Someone will need them in a game sometime. If you're just interested in Prussian Landwehr units of the 1750's, great! If you don't like the table of organization of the Roman army against Hannibal, change it. You might have to explain yourself to every history buff that comes down the pike, but what's the difference? If you're bugged too much about it, make it a fantasy army. No one can argue about that (But they will. "Didn't Gondor have more Foot Guards than that?").

Commentary, Ledder:

The situation is definitely not as the Western powers wished it. Italy's capture of Munich slows the Western Triple and may lead to Germany's downfall. But the Western powers are still a threat to the other countries. France has Italy on the defensive and Russia's situation is desperate in the North.

France and England seem to be directing the Western Triple. England has talked his way into Denmark and also seems to have the help of the German fleet against Sweden. England might have tried A edi-Nwy, F Nth-Den. In that case he could support himself from Denmark to Sweden and have a fleet in Sweden, rather than an army. He could also have a fleet in Barents in the spring.

Turkey has also played a curious move. Why not F Ank-Bla ? Perhaps an alliance has been formed between Russia and Turkey. We'll find out with

the Spring moves.

The winter builds will present some interesting choices. France will surely build a fleet in Marseilles, but will he also build F Brest, or A Paris? Italy might play A Mun-Bur, and France must decide how to deal with this threat. If he does not build A Paris, he may have to play A Spa-Gas.

Italy has outguessed Germany, and now must decide what to do with his extra build. A Venice would allow Italy to hold his position in Germany, but would give France an advantage in the Mediterranean. Two fleet builds would give Italy a good southern position, but more or less force

A Tyo-Pie.

Russia's obvious build is in St.P., either an army or a fleet in North Coast. But that will not likely prevent the loss of Sweden in 1902 and St.P in 1903. Russia might consider building an army in Warsaw, instead. Such a choice would entail a surrender in the North, however, it would give Russia a chance to gain Berlin and further establish Italy and Russia in Germany. This is a possibility worth considering, because it may force the dissolution of the Western Triple. Once England has taken Sweden and St.P and finds he cannot easily take Moscow, he'll likely decide to abandon on of his western allies. Commentary, Berch:

IR SQUARE OFF AGAINST WEST AS AUSTRIA PREPARES FOR PARADE OF SUITORS F'01 has been a very interesting season in the West. The FEG triple has materialized, but in unconventional form. Normally, if a fleet is placed against R, it will be in Bar or Ska. If England is to have 2 builds (not always the case), she gets Belgium. (continued one page 4)

Instead, the fleet is in Bal and the English are in Denmark. While it is possible that Den was taken without German approval, this is unlikely,

and I'll assume FEG has been running smoothly.

The problem for FEG is the considerable weakness in the German homeland. Italian resistance will be stiffened with his second build, and the placement of Rus A Sil means that if IR desires, Ber can be taken. Keep in mind that G must leave a home center open this winter, and Eng A Den can only lend a supporting role, as it 1) does not want to trespass Kiel and 2) will be distracted by Sweden. On the other hand, Russia too, has considerable problems. He faces the twin dangers of A Den-Lvn, and F Nwy-Stp - just in the spring. It will be very difficult for him to retain Berlin for a build. And he could be annihilated in the Balkans if A/T forms, losing both Rum and Sev.

The board has enormous scope for Diplomatic maneucering, unusual even for F'01. Further, as W'01 is separatedfrom F'01, the commentator's comments on the F'01 situation have a greater-than-normal opportunity

to cause mischief.

One of the first questions is whether EFG will survive as an alliance. Germany will certainly be ripe for a stab by his allies. One or both of the lowland armies will be moved toward Munich in SO2 and France will certainly get peemission to move A Par-Bur, if A Par is built. Thus G could easily be reduced to just Kiel or Ber by WO2 and could even be wiped out. This is the classic friend-or-fodder dilemma, and EF must carefully weigh whether they want IR to grow that fast. A typical ploy in this arena might be the following letter from I to G:

"Dear Jerry. I've paused from my devout memorization of your fantastic DW #22 to write you about AK. Sorry about Munich, but I had to do something about EFG, and taking Munich was all I could come up with. However, France is my true enemy and with a little co-operation, you can have Mun back without a fight. I'll move A Tyo-Pie, A Mun-Bur if you'll 1) support the latter with A Bel and 2) encourage F to move A Par-Bur. This gives me a good chance of taking Mar in SO2 to compensate for losing Mun and will gain me an ally against F. If F won't be going to Bur, how

about sliding over to Pic?"

These and other plans are described only at the level of alliance. The reader should note there are several levels of double-cross available. Germany might agree but betray Italy. Italy might tell England an inaccurate version of Germany's response, etc. Mitigating against an EF stab of G is 1) France's war with Italy means that he lacks a free hand, 2) France's aremies are mostly far off in Iberia, 3) England will surely be distracted by Swe & Stp. 4) EF can always agree to stab G later. In the meantime, G will grow slowly, taking the brunt of IR, while EF can expand more quickly, Once G gets his units into Boh-Sil-Pru, he will be vulnerable again to a stab.

A second consideration is the posture of Austria. An alliance with A would be very desirable to I, F, G, R and T; a remarkable situation. Those western powers who only sent a pro-forma letter to A will now be regretting their inattention. Italy's resources will be stretched to the limit by his western obligations, and he will be unprepared to deal with an Austrian attack, especially if he moves A Tyo-Pie in SO2. This attack will of course delight F and G and likely E as well.

It is likely that the <u>real</u> question to deal with is that of an <u>eastern</u> triple. Such an alliance is the natural result (continued on page 5)

of the blatant western triple, but: which one will form?

1. IAR is a sensible choice as these are the three countries closest to the westernfront. Only A & R would participate in this, as I will be busy elsewhere. Militarily this is only partially feasible. Assuming T builds F Smy, A-R can pin down the fleets in SO2 and take Bul in FO2. Russia will surely argue that he needs the build in the north in WO2. At this point, T will be able to stonewall. Aus can hold the Ion with A Ser-Gre, F Gre-Ion. The circumstances may require delay until 1903 in taking Bul. Meanwhile, Aus enters Tyo & Boh in SO2 to prop up the I-R effort in Germany.

2. TIR. This has probably greater long-run stability that AIR, but knocking A out quickly will likely be too great a strain on T-R as neither country is well placed to move on A in SO2. And an irate A could easily

open the door to the west.

3. ART. The timing of Italy's execution would be quite tricky--much more so than the analogous attack on Germany, The problem here is Tunis. If it falls to France, or to an Italy puppeting to France, it most likely cannot be retaken and the East will be stalled in the Med as a stalemate line can be formed. As Italy's units are on the front line against the west, stabbing him will not be difficult, but the elimination will aid the west greatly.

4. IAT. Similar considerations pertain here, with Stp taking the place of Tunis. Once Stp is taken by the west, it cannot be retaken by the

east and indeed Mos and even War would be vulnerable.

5. IART. The quadruple alliance, tho claustrophobic is feasible, provided T can be handled & is patient. If he has built F Smy, that fleet could be quite useful in supporting Tunis. It will also ensure that T

gets plenty of mail from the west.

Of these choices #1 is the safest for the east as the destruction of T can be done without endangering the principal action against the West. The main problem is the <u>IF</u> 10 France takes Naf early <u>and</u> 2) T builds F Smy, then F Gre will have 2 jobs - pinning down T F Smy and supporting I F Tun. The third consideration here is Russia's tactical choice in the north. Sweden is so hopeless he will likely not bother. But will the west convoy to Lvn? That is the crucialquestion. Germany may prefer to employ the fleet for Berlin or at most convoy to Pru. Russia must also concern himself with a supported attack on Stp in FO2, e.g. F Bar S A Nwy-Stp. The most flexible approach is A Mos/War/Stp-Lvn, F Gob-Stp(sc). This guarantees Stp unless 1) the very unlikely F bal-Gob occurs or 2) A Mos/War/Stp-Lvn succeeds, but its support is cut in FO2 by F Bal-Lvn, but this is too much selflessness to expect of Germany. It also blocks the convoy to Lvn & assures a choice of units to defend War if A Den-Pru occurs. A second approach is to build F/A Stp and move the unit to Nwy and try F Gob-Bal, figuring to let F Bal-Ber succeed. Alternatively, the fleet guards Stp & A War-Pru steps up the pressure on Berlin. Bear in mind that G and R may reconcile, especially if Russia fears he is odd man out in the Balkans. Summarizing the east, IR are allied, with A-T in conflict. If IR agree on a victim, the other of A/T will likely agree. R will prefer T as victim, as he is better equipped to deal with an angry T than an angry A. Italy will likely not veto Russia's choice, as Italy won't be participating in the attack. The west, meanwhile, will push for an A-T alliance, which will leave the front line countries (IR) isolated. Sensing his weakness, T may push hard for a quadruple alliance. SO2 should be a lot of fun!
