

PEACE IS AT HAND

Vienna (API) - At 12:30 AM this morning peace was declared in the WAR OF ROSES AND THORNS. When the articles of peace were signed our forces held territories stretching from Moscow to Marseilles and Livonia to Greece.

Overall our brave forces were the most numberous in Europe with the English a somewhat distant second. While the war was indeed one of "roses" for Austria-Hungary and England, it was for Russia a war of "thorns: With the outbreak of hostilites the Russian Bear made a bold move against our northern regions threating both Vienna and Budapest. But if the Russian thought he was in a rose garden he soon found that t was in reality a thorn patch. With much appreciated help from the Sultan our

forces were able to push the Russians out of A-H. In 1904 we supported the Sultan's forces in his overthrow of Moscow, thus throwing Russia into civil disorder.

In the north and west Germany spent most of the war keeping England and France from a strong alliance and push against the Vaterland. For the most part Germany succeed in this task and in 1905 she was equal in strength to A-H. England's efforts were slow starting when she ordered two fleets to the North Sea simultaneously. This so upset the Queen that the old girl passed on and King Edward took the ship of state (the one that didn't enter the North Sea most likely). In the end England controlled most of the northern parts of Europe.

France turned against her ally Italy in 1904 and had Italy on the ropes. However while the frog swam in the Mediterranean the hun decided Paris would be a nice place to spend the fall, and Paris did. In the end France declared civil disorder and ended up in a tie with her victim, Italy. The Italian commander was quoted as saying to the French commander: "That-a serves-a yoo right, from-a now on frog-legs will-a be our national dish." The valiant Italian fleet (the only Italian unit on the map for most of 1905-1906) outmaneuvered attempts to eliminate Italy entirely. During the last move she recatured a home supply center and doubled the size of Italy's armed forces.

There were two oddities concerning final positions of forces. While Turkey was bottled up at home for the most part at the end, the Sultan had succeed in capturing Berlin!! The German player was not able to recapture Berlin on the last turn thus ending any chance of perserving the honor of a multitude of German frauleins. The other oddity involved the Russian fleet at Constantinople. The commander of only Russian unit on the board at the end was quoted as saying "We Russians have always coveted the Dardanelles but not at this price."

The following are excerpts from the Easter Message of Tsar Nikolai II to the Nations (4-25-1906):

- ...I wish peace and good-will to all nations on this day following the end of the Italian Renaissance War. For the past year we of Mother Russia have sought to stay out of the general fracas that has embroiled Europe for the past 6 years. The Sultan, Kaiser, and Prime Minister of England will attest to the fact that for the past year to year and a half I assured and carried out the assurance that Russia would not disturb their holdings. Even the common man on the street can look back and see what consternation Russia could have caused Turkey and England during the past two years had we wished to. In fact even now I must deal with those elements in my country, military and court who felt I was "weak" in sitting on our fall 1904 holdings...
- ... to the unfortunate people of Austria-Hungary I extend my sympathies. It is tragic whenever a nation declars civil disorder, but to do so when she is the fourth strongest nation in Europe is a great disservice to the Austro-Hungarian people. I pray that your Italian rulers may rule benevolently while sternly dealing with the Hapsburgs who so shamefully abandoned you...
 - ... concerning the victorious Italian nation, we are most watchful. The plight of the Austro-Hungarians as well as the French, whose government fell in fall 1905, <u>must</u> be eased. Spanish olives had better be plentiful in Budapest and Hungarian goulash had better be abundant in Marseilles and Iberia...
 - ...had our English neighbors been slightly less intransigent they could have saved the embarassing situation of losing the North Sea for much of the last year and a half not to mention signing the peace treaty with a British army in Ruhr cut off from the sea. An obscure seer by the name of Rasputin came to court today and foretold that the English army cut off from the sea on the Continent was a portent of the future. He said that within 50 years another English army on the continent would be threatened with isolation from the sea. However the future army would escape, he said, unlike the army presently in the Ruhr...
 - ...to our German neighbors-we wish you well and hope that you will accept our invitation to send your liasons to our authorities in all of Scandanavia. May the Russian fleets in Denmark and Norway as well as the German fleets and armies join together to promote "stablilty to the region" (a phrase I picked up in a dream of the future)...
- ... Finally I say to all the peoples of Europe, may your rulers be as kind and benevolent toward you as I have been toward them.

Ed. Comment - It isn't often that you find Italy on the top of the heap in "Country Ratings", but just like in baseball "it's too early ir the season to consider the averages". On the other hand even if we include the 5 Louisville games mentioned in last week's <u>Dip Ratings</u> Italy would only slip to 2nd. The Italian win will keep her high in the ratings for several games even if she does not fair as well in the next few games.

The key for keeping your rating or a country's rating up is to avoid elimination. France's elimination in game 2 has placed her in the position not only of being in the cellar but also of being almost five times weaker than the next to last place country, Russia.

A final observation concerning country standings- Using almost the same rating system, The WG to D rates our top three countries (Italy, A-H, Germany) as the bottom three countries! Difference-our rating is based on 2 games while their's is based on 803 games!



The Nature of DIPLOMACY

DIPLOMACY is a game of intense competition. It is not a "nice" game . . . that is, it is a game where some vices become virtues. In real life we don't lie to our friends, nor betray trust, nor attack without warning. We do in DIPLOMACY. Often. The First Commandment in DIPLOMACY is, "Thou shalt covet they neighbor's supply centers."

A player must always remember that DIPLOMACY is only a game. He should realize that the friend who stabs him in the back and rips off three supply centers is not a terrible person: he is just playing DIPLOMACY. And he is playing it very well.

DIPLOMACY demands maturity: the ability to distinguish between a game and reality. Appeals to friendship and past favors have no relevance to the game. Neither do displays of bad temper.

"Good" DIPLOMACY

The ideal DIPLOMACY game, according to its designer, is one in which the Balance of Power is preserved. Whenever any player gets too large, his neighbors combine to cut him down. He in turn joins in the alliance to bring down the next leader . . . and so on and on. An actual game of DIPLOMACY seldom meets that ideal.

A good DIPLOMACY game is something quite different. It is a game in which all the players enjoy themselves. Much of that has to do with where and how the game is set up.

Attitude will have a strong effect on fun. Those who worry too much about winning, or about playing the "right" way, or about being a "good" player, will interfere with their own enjoyment of the gaming experience. Taking the game too seriously is a heavy mistake.

"The Price We Paid For War" CONDENSED ARTICLE DEPT. If the question were to be posed, What were the broad historical circumstances out of which WWI arose? one would probably be safe in naming two: 1) The failure to find a place in the European order for the recently formed German State (1870); 2) The rivalry between Russia and Austria-Hungary over the succession to declining Turkish control in the Balkans. The European order emerging from the Napoleonic Wars was not flexible enough to stand the subtraction of one great power in the southeast of the continent and the addition of a new one in the northwest. The tragedy of Germany's situation lay in the fact that with the formation of a united Germany the two provinces, Alsace and Lorraine (previously part of France), were incorportated into Germany (this being an outcome of the Franco-Prussian War of 1870-1871). This territorial change was never really accepted by the French. Thus France never really accepted Germany into the family of the European powers. In the decades just prior to WWI France was actually more hostile to the existing status quo in Europe than was Germany. Germany was a satiated power in Europe; France was not. Germany had no territorial aspirations anywhere on the continent; France did.

The war, as it turned out, produced the destruction of all three of the great empires so prominently involved in its outbreak: the Austro-Hungarian, the Russian, and the German. This was something which no one-not even the French and British, but least of all the statesmen of those three empires themselves-wished or expected to achieve when they went to war

in 1914, and from which no one really profited.
