Pete Gaughan and Mike Connor are to be thanked for doing a wonderful job running the Dip tourney this year. It was very organized and much appreciated. Ben Schilling also deserves a big thank you for running the Gumboat tourney. I am happy to brag again this year about my gwn finish. I played 2 games and kept my alliance from Spring 1901 until the finish. Jack Brawner(France) and I(Germany) played a two-way in round 2. Each of us had a minor ally, Russia(Mark Frueh) and Italy(Chris Pearce) that worked with us against the A/T that survived the draw. In round one, I organized a western-triple (EFG) as England with Doug Ingram(Germany) and Robert Eskridge(France). We played the triple all the way ending with 11 centers apiece and a 1 center Turkey surviving. Dipcon was a great time for me. I rode with Mark Luedi, Matt Fleming, Mark Frueh and Mancy Irwin. We stayed at Jeff Hines' in Dallas. James Woodson stayed with us, too. I met David Frick, J.R. and David Baker at Dipcon. In fact, J.R. took over the France in my round one game and continued the EFG triple to the end. Of course, other subbers Luedi, Fleming and Schilling were there, along with many other dippers that I have know postally. The first 4 finishers in the tourney had the only 4 tourney wins this year, with Jeff Key winning. The latest Europa Express has Honest Al Pearson claiming the best finish for a postal player was some "deadwood" from Indiana by the name of Kleiman. That goes to show you that the best Diplomacy players are not a part of the postal hobby yet, and that the placing of DIPCOM in cities like Dallas or Seattle can do nothing but allow the postal hobby to grow. 


