#### Game Statements

BISMARCK - 1983AK

Turkey: Another game ended by the dreaded stalemate line. I congratulate the standbys Fleming and Hager who got in and worked together. But don't do it again!

England: Essentially I think that there were two phases to this game. Phase one had John convincing the whole board to play stupidly and let him have the win.

Phase two saw the idiots MMR out and brought in the standbys that could help Rob stop the Turks advance. Since the new players were. Ken Hager and myself, naturally we saw the thing to do was stop the Turk's win. And it was a close thing, John almost got it. Too bad Mr. Phil couldn't get a survival.

Thanks for this game, Dave. Nice job, but you might come to regret having called me, as this game saw the rise of, who else, Lord Lycanthropy!

Germany: First, to Rob and Matt, congratulations on the effort. That was a nice job to throw together an alliance like that and then get into a stalemate line. I've enjoyed working with both of you.

I also offer my condolences to John for being stopped at 17 centers. Also, I'd like to thank you for the valuable inspiration that you provided that helped us to get out act together. Your press comments like "too little too late" and "too bad that collectively you are not better" certainly helped to provide the incentive to keep us going.

France: At long last, my first complete 'official' PBM Diplomacy game has come to an end. I'm glad to say that I've learned about several of the broad catagories of players which you can seet in a game, from the utterly loyal ally to the duplicitous backstabber, and from the gamer who takes writing letters seriously to the one who would never break under torture. I'll let those of you who kept an eye on the game decide who was who.

I don't have my back-issues or my letter file at hand, so I suppose the rest of this will just be some general impressions of the way the game went.

I started the game off on the right foot by promising England (then Bruce Kleinman) that I'd honor the Channel as a neutral zone. Come ordering time, however, I had honestly forgotten my promise and forged an alliance with Germany (then David Blaylock) to subjugate England. 1901 progressed, and I must admit Bruce took things well. No "I'll hate you forever" communiques, "dear scum" letters, etc. Just an "oh, well; hope to see you another game."

Austria's NMR in Fall 1901 changed things to Italy's (Alain Chabot) sudden rise to power with numerous builds. Germany and I both were concerned and thus formed a western triple. E and 6 went after Russia while I was trying to form some sort of alliance with Turkey (your favorite and mine, John Crosby, esquire) to calm things down in the Med.

Everything after that is sort of a haze to se. I remember that Russia succumbed fairly quickly and England gained St. Pete, only to find that he now only shared frontiers with Germany and I. Tim Allen was now in control, Bruce having dropped for unexplained reasons, and made the decision that always seem to screw up the Triple. I was just glad that it was Germany instead of me who got the pointy end of the dagger. Soon afterwards, Blaylock disappeared from the zine and Ken Hager took over.

Meanwhile in the south, Italy was fending me off pretty well. Somewhere along the line, though it was pretty early, Alain

resigned due to excessive responsibilities with a university in Canada, and in came Phil Redmond. Phil realized a lot earlier than I did what was going on down there, but I smelled supply centers and kept at him. What Phil had sensed was the oncoming Turkish juggernaut, which had been promulgated by Italy and Russia fighting two-front wars and a non-existant Austria. Nobody was really there to hold John back.

My alliance with Turkey was always shaky. It seems to me now that John never really did commit himself to anything, or make any promises. He would suggest that he would do something that help me out, but I'd then receive a letter saying due to problems elsewhere, "so sorry old chap, hope you'll understand."

Well, we now have Austria gone, Russia and Italy on the ropes, and the west in disarray. After communicating with Crosby, I was led to believe that if I turned around and knocked England down to size, John would halt at Italy and concentrate his efforts northward for the rest of the game. Essentially, I would be granted second-place to John's win. Well, I believed him and soon found out that he'd been leading we along for the entire game. Turkish fleets were west of Italy and I wasn't well-represented in the area.

About them, Allen MMRed out and in popped Matt Fleming to take over England. Thank, God. Matt pulled the western triple back together and the rest is history. With mutual cooperation, an EFG stalemate line was set up all the way from Spain to St. Pete and Crosby was forever held at 17 centers.

In conclusion, I'd just like to congratulate two players for excellent play. Take a bow, Mr. Fleming and Mr. Crosby.

SM: I always hate to see a game with so many substitutions as this one had, but the standbys (Steve, Ken, Matt and Phil) are to be commended in allowing the game to go on. It was a lot of fun toward the end to watch this well-played game. I knew what John was going through, as he was putting Randy Karmolinski through it in 1983U and I was hearing Randy's comments. Ah, stalemate lines - the dread of a powerful country and the motive for the little guys. John and Rob were the only surviving starters, and David Baker finished his position. All and all, the Bismarck was a very enjoyable game to run, and I only hope that each of the players enjoyed it as much as I did.

#### JAMES T. KIRK - 198306

Austria: I took over Austria in FO7. For a standby, it was an excellent position. To me, it looked like Aus-Turkey was going to stalemate against Eng-France, but that never happened. In the eight weeks I played, I never received a letter from Pat. Kind of makes it difficult to continue the Aus-Turkey alliance. However, both France and England hinted at alliances. I answered both, and I let Russia die (to facilitate the English alliance). It was send more weeks before Dave bothered to write me again (and only after it was clear I was trusting Nelson not to attack). Nelson called me several times and wrote even more. With great difficulty, we came to an agreement (I would attack Turkey and he would go after England). I don't know if Nelson would have tried to stab me instead of going against England. However, since nobody else was willing to write, I felt I had little choice. I think Nelson would have gone against England (the whole time eyeing when to turn on me) and made it a very close game between the two of us. I was one of the two who NYR'ed. If I had realized there had been a proposal, I would have voted against it. The game was going to get more exciting, and I wanted to see what Nelson was going to do.

Italy: If they paid so little attention to the game that they didn't know they were supposed to vote, why do they want to continue? Further, if they don't want to be subject to your published house rules, why would you let them play in ANY game? Still further, if you are going to throw out that particular rule, then you should "continue" all the other games previously ended. What are the rules for, anyway? I don't think they should have any excuse for being so childish as to even ask such a thing.

I am willing to re-play the entire game from Spring 1901 and pay a new game fee for doing so (with the same original players, or the replacements, or with different players or any combination of the forgoing, with the same or different positions, but I suggest that some or all of us pay new game fees).

The James T. Kirk game was officially, and very properly, ended, according to your published rules (which have NOT been changed at all) and the only fair way to re-start it is with everyone back in their Spring 1901 positions.

I think its perfectly fine for a Gamemaster to change his rules as often as he likes, but I have NEVER seen anyone make a rule-change retroactive (especially after the end of the game).

France: If this statement makes print, then obviously there was not unanimous agreement amongst the players to restart the game. As such, in my opinion, this game has come to an ill-timed, hasty, and premature death. I would also go so far as to opine that for those players who voted for the 4-way draw (with the exception of Italy, if he did so vote in favor), they chose the low road and copped out for tablescraps rather than risking a try for the main banquet. Not to spare myself, of course, much of the blame for this absurd travesty (approved by only 3 players) rests upon my shoulders. I freely confess that I was one of the two players who made toe colossal blunder of forgetting about the draw proposal and failing to register a veto vote. Since my hobby writing effort seems to have declined markedly these past few months or so, it would appear that I will be making up for lost time

in this end-game statement. Well, so be it, then, and, in fact, I do have some rather pertinent observations to make about the play of myself and others in this particular game. So, hang on...

Taking myslef to task, first, I feel I made 2 enormous errors in this game. The mechanical error of failing to veto the 4-way draw looms largest, of course; after all, that mistake helped end the game. Furthermore, it was plain and simple a boneheaded mistake. However, on a strategic level - perhaps more interesting to those hoping to learn from the mistakes of others - I also made a major error in the manner in which I conducted my alliance with Italy. Being a person who tends to favor alliances with those with whom I enjoy a pleasant rapport in my communication, I early on established such a relationship (in my view) with Steve Cartier of Italy. No regrets, there. Where the problem arose however, which I did not recognize until it was almost too late, was his sacrificial styl of play. His encouragement and real board support allowed my France to grow at a rapid - too rapid - rate. While Steve succeeded in having two Italian armies uniquely positioned in Germany, he accomplished this at the expense, however, of losing all his home centers to the Austro/Turkish enemy. Consequently, due to his tactics - the ultimate strategic purpose of which I entertain only the foggiest notion of - I found myself in the position of being a 10-center front runner with no viable ally. Although Italy remained loyal, all he could do at that point was help me hold the stalemate line in northern central Europe and encourage me to attack England for additional centers. With his home centers lost, he was of no value to our cause in the south.

This situation was especially critical because I had been unable to achieve any other type of worthwhile alliance. Although I and Italy had agreed to attack Bermany, the first English player ((Pierce)) would not actively assist us because - it was soon revealed - he was only in the game at the German's behest anyways! ((unknowningly to the GM, too)) It seems they both knew each other through SciFi PBM. Fortunately, though, his commections with the German player was somewhat tenuous and he agreed to at least not actively oppose us. As time went on, it became apparent that the English player's understanding of Dip was at best very rudimentary in nature. Siven the pliability of this situation, I soon began to perceive that I might have in him a nice, subservient player who would enjoy a good game for himself - under my guidance - until such time as necessity determined the plug be pulled. Most unfortunately, however, this player proceeded to NMR out of the game! Thus, I was left high and dry without a friend at my back. And thus entered Mr. Frick...

This individual entered upon the standby position just when Cartier was urging me to attack England in order to get the builds to use in breaking the statemate between us and and the Austro-Turkish combo. And boy, was I drooting to do so! However, Frick turned out to be not at all tractible as the original English player. In fact, he turned out to be rather formidable. With my units already on his little isle, he made it quite clear that a continued attack on him would result in his devoting full attention toward me. Sober analysis of the board clearly revealed that in order to wage war upon England, I would have to divert key units essential to the maintenance of the statemate line vs. Austria/Turkey. Frick took a hardball line and I was forced to bow to it (Italy being of little real value due to his board position). However, Frick's attitude during this period left a residue of resentment within me. And this feuling, pled with the paucity of his coorespondence, left me constantly casting a glance over the wall toward greener pastures.

The only greener pasture, however, happened to be red and yellow in hue. And both of those parties, Lobdell "the Third" of Austria and Pakel of Turkey, seemed to have an alliance made in heaven. Or, at least they preferred to act that way. It appeared to be obviously AT all the way with Turkey insisting on leaving himself obscenely open to an Austrian stab...However, since the Austrian Lobdell never, ever, ever contacted me during the entire game (not even an intro), I rather suspected there would be no hope for an Austrian stab of Turkey. Thus, between the two of them, I found myself irritated by Pakel's naive innocence, infuriated by Lobdell's arrogance in not bothering to even extend the courtesy of dropping a line, and stymied by their love match. In addition, Pakel kept dropping me these letters wherein he advocated 3- and 4-way draws as early as 1905, which I also found nettlesome. Pat, my dear boy, the object of the game is to MIN! And, failing that, 2 or 3 ways are perfectly fine in a well-played game. But deliberately copping out for a 4-way so early on? Hell, that isn't even half the board gone. What kind of satisfaction can you receive from a situation wherein 7 players start a game and 4 of them figure in the final standings? Hardly worthwhile in my opinion...

Anyways, I reluctantly went along with Frick hoping he could send units north to attack Austria and break that stalemate line from the rear. However, his efforts to have an "English" army in Kiel (which my Italian army occupied and in any event fell within my sphere of influence) continued the process of hardly endearing himself to me.

Suddenly, however, matters took a dramatic turn with the abrupt resignation of Lobdell III. The new standby player, Piper, was completely unknown to me, but, joy of joy, I finally got my first correspondence from the Austrian position in this game. And wonderfully enough, he and I hit it off - so much so - in fact, that we reached an alliance agreement. Hence his moves to strike the wide open, exposed and vulnerable Turkish centers; thus, too, my beginning moves to swing back north vs. England - movement which would have been much more evident in the next season or so, my dear David...


As should be evident, the upshot of my blunder in not vetoing the draw (although one other person failed to vote also, may I point out) definitely let Pakel, the Turkish player, off the hook. If this insipid draw proposal was your idea, I suppose you must get credit for it. However, that's one hell of a way to play the game: propose a ridiculous draw and hope for an NMR or two...But frankly, if it hadn't happened, you were dogment, Pat - sweet and simple. Piper would have cleaned your clock like taking candy from a baby. My own efforts against Frick would have been much, much harder, and quite possibly, less successful. Eventually, I believe I could have worn him down, but it would have been long and drawn out and, quite possibly, Piper's conquest might have

given him an excellent shot for victory, while I was still messing around with Frick. But, I was willing to take that chance just to get another shot at England. I was at the point where I just wanted to give Frick a run for his money instead of slinking away like a cur the way I did before. Oh, well...instead we now have this stupid draw. I almost was going to resign from the draw (if that were possible), but, that probably would have been blunder \$3 on my part. Instand, I've chosen to vent my feelings in the end-game statement in the manner you have just witnessed.

So, while I'm sorry the game ended the way it did, I am glad that Piper shared in part of the decision. I felt you effectively tempered trust with caution and I enjoyed our correspondence, Steve. I'd took forward to playing with you against as an ally. Frick also probably deserves his share of the win; after all, he did force me to back down. Still, real allies engage in real communication, my friend, and your propensity for spotty and snide correspondence is not an asset. Pat, all I can say is your willingness, nay, even eagerness, for 4-ways and what not, leaves the impression of a player who scrambles for the easy quick change instead of trying for the big bucks. Do large draws really turn you on that much? Steve, I definitely enjoyed your correspondence - your insight on the early hobby and on certain board situations was highly informative for me. Your style of play leaves me mystified, though, as clearly your goal in the game was not to finish well, necessarily. Just what are your goals, anyway? I haven't the slightest. After 15+ years of play, your perception of the game could well be something radically unique. Of the others, I really have nothing to remark upon. Until we meet again, fellows...

Oh, wait, wait...proper decorum mandates a few well chosen comments concerning the GMing, now doesn't it, Dave, eh? Well, what can I say? I s-u-p-p-o-s-e 6 months is a reasonable time to get our game year straightened out, right Hal? Nah, seriously, I feel our game was expertly GM'd. Dave, your straight forward, no nonsense approach works well especially for those who are basically interested in just playing the game. You are a fine GM and I would have no hesitation playing again in your zine or recommending others to do so. Also, tell HAL to correct my typos, eh?

6M: Well, Nelson, I may have just burned up a few of Hal's circuits. I thought that someone that wrote as much as you would have learned to type better. Well, in seriousness, this ending was something tough to handle. As Steve points out, the houserules are clear and the proposal was printed clearly, so why shouldn't the game end? I obviously knew that at least 1 person wanted to game to continue, so I proposed that to the players - giving everyone the chance to say, "No, it's over." As always, I was trying to please the players. Other than that - and the game year problem I had, this was a smooth game. I hope you all enjoyed it as much as I did.






