1976JG (John Kador) As one of the two original players in this old same, I can, with some effort, recall the early days of 1976JG. Poking through the haze I recall friendly relations with England theroughout the game. Austria stabbed me in Fall '02 after I rebuked his attempt to form a cross-game alliance, to David Nouth his name was and we were in another game together. I told him I didn't work that way. So he stabbed me. With my help, one lone Russian unit managed to be quite a pain in his side for a long time. Actually, most of the drama in the ga came with England's growth to 15 or kis. I was anxious to end the game at that point (maybe three game years ago), but he had made a commitment to Germany and he was going to keep it. Germany was to come in second before me. I believe Randolph might have taken the three more game years to whittle me down to secure that end had Germany not screwed up with NMRs. But I believed I deserved second place and I argued forcefully for it. That went back and forth about six times before Randolph saw it my way. Then he asked for 2 of my centers in the bargain! Why mi? I came in second and the game is over. I'd like to congratulate Randolph for a good game, but in all conscience (and I don't think he'd agree with me), the competition in this game was poor. I'm proud that throughout the game, E and T never fought over a center and never lied to each other.

(Randolph Smyth) This was one of the more interesting postal games I've ever played in; I got to use some tactical resources that I've never used before, resulting in my lat ever victory as E. The game got off to a good (?) start with a G alliance, since both F & R preved unreliab and dropped out within a few game years. Meanwhile the original I embarked on an interesting. but not very smart northern campaign against G, occupying tyo, bih, & sil. Unfortunately for him G had no other enemies and never lost a home center to this pressure. I loved it because nominal G diversions allowed me to get the jump on R, then F, while G himself wen nowhere. The

southeast wasn't moving either -- I believe A (with some I help) was fighting T/R.

At this point, TMM folded, and the game went into limbo for almost a year before Steve piske it up. John Kador(T) and I were the only players to survive the stay in orphanage ((+EV, DM)) so we were playing a whole new game. Oddly I thought the replacements were all better players than their original counterparts, yet within another year my position had really taken off. This was due mostly to a loyal new C ally, and waning I interest in attacking him. R was driven from his home centers, then F collapsed quickly as well. I was able to grab most of the gains myself as G had agreed to a second place finsih. Meanwhile A/I vs T/R continued,

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providing no opposition.

It wasn't until I swept into the Med. and G attacked A that they realized they were next. The entire southeast combined against us, but it was too little too late.

Resistence stiffened against G and I became determined not to let a last minute surprise deprive me of victory. I set up a huge block of "hostage centers" — all were German but under firm E control. G's cooperation was then assured and I could always fall back on those centers to carry me to a win. I had plans to continue this strategy, ceding nap, ven, and turn to G. Unfortunately, Tom's interest seemed to drift. When the letters stopped coming and a few NMRs crept in, I took the hostages permantly to win ahead of schedule. (I believe the capture of 9 centers in a single game year may be a hobby record). My particular thanks to Tom for making the win effortless, and congratulations to John who stuck with the game for 4 years to take a convincing 2nd place. Lest we forget, the game might still be in orphanage if not for Steve CMing it to completion (with never an err that I can remember). That and the long deadlines ((4 weeks)) have made Ter-ran my favorite "playing" zine in the US. A final note of thanks to the other Ter-ran opponents who made the best of some pretty poor standby positions, and made some facets of the game interesting intil the final season.

I have been an active Diplomacy player for over a year and a half, and during that time I found myself in the position of needing a place to go with a problem in one of my games. In all honesty, there is no where to go.

If you have a problem, forget the publishers; there seems to be a code of ethics among them that dictates they back one another. No one wents to get involved in anyone else's sine's problems. Each publisher feels a guy can run his sine however he chooses. Ligitimate complain

by players are put down as "the CM is always right".

In my case I managed to find a few GMs who would listen and one, Lee Kendter Sr., went out of his way to help me. In no way, however, would I suggest everyone writing to lee; he is not the orbudeness, and he hasn't the thee to help all of wh. (Jerry Jones is another good listener and problem solver, forever bothered by our problems.

It is about time that we the players join together and try to help each other out. If we unite, we have a glimmer of hope, that a publisher will listen. As it is now, if 4 players have legitimate complaints in the same game/sine, no one will listen. If we band together

I don't see how publishers can refure, at least, to listen to our side.

What is becoming the current player-solution? PROTEST RESIGNATIONS! I was and am as guilty as the rest of you when it comes to protest resignations. I do not condone resignations nor NNRing out as a form of complaint; but I found no solution to the problem I was having with a GM and therefore decided the only way to avoid the hassles was to resing. Another player in that game, who was also having problems, resigned with me. A third player just never sent in orders again. A full 7-pulayer game now had 3 new players in 1903. Could this have been avoided? If we had been able to find someone who could help, at least listen, or maybe speak to our GM, it might have helped.

Therefore say let's give them pleyer board a chance. If publishers can stick togethe why not us (besides I haved giving up a terrific position).

I ak everyone, who has an opinion of this, to contact Jerry Jones at 1854 Wagner St., Pasedena, Calif. 91107. Jerry will have my total support, and I will do everything I can to make this player board a reality. I ask all of you to help with this project -- whats one more letter -- let Jerry know that we appreciate his efforts and intend to follow through for him. This is our habby, lets get involved in making it a better one -- especially for the players! A player board may be just the solution we need to get our side heard. ((KB asked me to make a comment or 2: First, I feel you should drop Jerry Jones a note, regardless whether you are pro, con, or completely apathetic - it helps to hear from all the viewpoints. Second, in most of the zines you are in, I would hope that you could talk to the CM lili if you can't then KE's point is valid. If you find someone to say you're right, he will find someone to say you're wrong, and the point remains unresolved; and a GM to enter the fray would be akin to that old proverb of "living in a glass house and throwing rocks".
