For those of you who haven't already heard, the postal service may or may not be on strike before the next due date -- or before the next time can be mailed. In the event that the strike occurs prior to the due date, the date would then be extended until the first Friday after full resumption of services. Otherwise ... whenever.

As you might gather I tend, by virtue of my job, to hear more about postal incidences than most. I would like to clarify a few things. (1) We don't make \$40,000, \$35,000, or even \$25,000 as an average wage -- you might note that this would be extremely difficult when the absolute top scale is a hair over 24,000. (2) We are not paid more than "those in comparable fields". Though we do make more than a MacDonald's worker, we make less than a UPS worker (the only real true gage of "comparable" jobs). (3) Postal workers do not want a wage increase. True, what would like the \$40/month the Office of Personnel & Management took away when raising our health benefits contribution, and true we would like the \$300-/year we must throw away on a useless(for us) Medicare system. There are other issues that mean more to your Joe Mailman on the street: For instance, we are given sick leave, but not allowed to use it without being "disciplined". We are given vacation time, but not allowed to use it outside of vacation periods (May-Sept) except in rare circumstances. We work in a "big brother atmosphere" where two-way mirrors line the walls of the insides of major post offices and tri-weekly check-ups on the street by people hiding in cars is commonplace...computers attached to our vehicles record what we're doing every other second, and a flub on our part must be documented in triplicate to ascertain innocence. Postal employees are forbidden to be politically active; for example, I can not say Reagan is an a---, Mondale a damn f---(fool), etc.

These are things that are on the minds of most employees, not whether we are over or under paid. ... and on overpaid, well, last year a Lorain mailman had his nose bitten off by a dog, another his leg maimed; we carried full days in -60 windchill, lightening storms, and 90-90+ days ((over 90 degrees, with over 90% humidity)) True we may make more than a hamburger slinger, but then for \$4/hour you aren't going to get many people to put up with the crap we take for very long.

#### SPEAKING OF POLITICS ...

As the November elections loom ever closer, let us stand in unison and pray that our two erstwhile candidates will: (1) refrain from talking about ~~the~~ what they will do with the military for which task neither is experienced (2) refrain from promising us things that can only be granted by congress and (3) refrain from mentioning the fact that Mondale's VP is a "minority".

As for our potential VP, I do hope that people see see through her cloak of being a woman and review her past record before deciding to vote for her ... the word liberal does not seem sufficient to describe her political views.

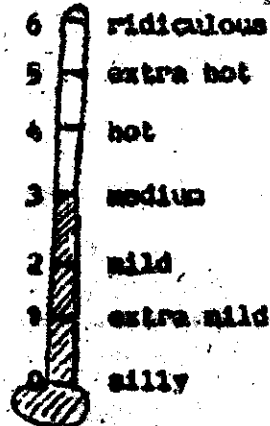
FAZ: Did you hear about the Polish Godfather that makes you an offer you can't understand? No? How about the Polish mosquitos ... that died of malaria?

About a year ago I moved from Michigan, where I grew up, to Texas. The effects of culture shock were substantial, but I have slowly gotten used to life as a foreigner. One area that I quickly adapted to, however, is that of food--it's great here. Being one who occasionally enjoys experimenting in the kitchen, I have come up with a cross-cultural recipe, which I would like to share with the readers of 22.

### BOB FOOTE'S HOMEMADE MICH-TEX FIRE SAUCE

- 1 28 oz can tomatoes & juice, chopped
- 1 Medium onion, finely chopped
- 1 large clove garlic, finely chopped
- 0-6 Jalapeno peppers, finely chopped (see chart)
- 1/2 Cup vinegar
- 1 Tsp oregano
- 1 Small bay leaf
- 1 Tsp cocoa powder



Combine all this stuff and cook it in a crock pot for 4-6 hours on high or all night on low, or simmer gently on the stove for 1-2 hours. The kitchen should be well ventilated if you use 4 or more peppers.

I like to feel the stuff as it goes down, but I'm not a masochist, so I use 4 peppers when I make it. For the timid or faint-hearted, use 1 or 2 peppers. The rest of you can start with 3. I use it for breakfast on my eggs, which I share with my cat. He loves it!
