Hartley Patterson notes that recent issues of his Diplomacy'zine, WAR BULLETIN, contain info on 4000 A.D., "the first commercial space game marketed here (by Waddington)". He also notes that "it looks good for postal play and I hope to get the first game going soon. It includes moving in hyperspace out of sight of other players, supply bases, etc."

For those interested in keeping track of such things, we should note that issue #3 of THE ORIFLANME, journal of the Southern Reaches of the Society of Creative Anachronism (50¢, from POBox 1245, Florence, SC 29501 (editorial mail; subs to David Mathews, Ivy Rd., Canton, GA 30114, from whom we assume one also obtains back-issues)), contains a short article, "Golden Age of Chess", by "Carl the Chess-player".

Also, we recently received, from John Beshara, a copy of PARADE magazine (a Sunday supplement) for May 14, 1972, in which appeared an article, "Peace Is the Name of the Game", by Herbert Kupferberg, on "peace" (diplomatic) games. One page in length, it covers (briefly) Avalon Hill's Origins of World War II and Games Research's Diplomacy. (We should also note that the article prominently mentions The Diplomacy Association, its magazine WAZIR, and its founder John Beshara.)

A while back Fred Davis sent us a xeroxed copy of an article from the October 18, 1971 issue of MONEYSWORTH, "Value Judgment: Board Games for Bored Adults", a one-pager which briefly discusses the state of the adult game market today, and lists several of the "top-notch" games of today, by category (e.g., "Financial", "War", "Ecology", "Women's Liberation", "Psychological", "Mathematical", and "Misc."), with a brief description of each, the price, and the address of the manufacturer.

While we're on articles on games appearing in the general press, we might as well note several others which have appeared over the past couple of years and have not yet been mentioned in TGL: (1) A while back we mentioned Sid Sackson's games/review column in the pre-Christmas issue of BOOK WORLD (THE WASHINGTON POST Sunday Book Supplement) (19 Dec '71). Some time ago we received a complimentary copy of the game of Quads, invented by Armin Speer, 666 Fifth Ave., NY, NY 10019 (copyrighted 1969). This consists of a 4-page rulebook and four playing grids/clue recorders (each 44 x 62, offset). It is a cousin of "Salvo" and "The Naval War Game", and falls between the two in skill-level; basically, each player places three "Quads" (four circles, in a square) on his board, and then they fire "volleys" in turn of five shots each, informing each other of how many circles (but not which ones) have been hit; object is to locate all circles in opponent's three quads before he finds yours. Send for a free sample (if they're still available); no price is given for a regular set.

Triples, using cots, will also be \$5 per person per night. There will be no parking fees of any sort. The airport is five miles from the tournament site. Then There is a minimum guaranteed \$1500 prize fund, to be awarded as follows: First place, a guarantood \$400 / trophy; next four places are \$240, \$120, \$80, \$60, plus trophies. These will be raised if entries permit it. collection contains translations of poems originally written in Russian (together with the original), lh English poems, and 18 Chess problems composed by the author. "End-Games of Duchamp: We're Still Playing Them", by Paul Richard (THE WASHINGTON POST, 10 Aug '71), in which is discussed Dialogues with Marcel Duchamp, trans. from the French and published by Viking Press, with particular emphasis upon Duchamp's flirtation with (incl. co-authorship of The Opposition and Sister Squares Are Reconciled, a book on end-games, in 1932 attitudes towards Chess. 'Nuff for now.

We had planned to continue with our saga of the Fischer/Spassky World Chess Championships, but decided to hold this until nextish. To date, we have covered, in TGL's 32, 35, 36, & 39, events thru 6 July as covered by the local press. We will wrap-up pregame maneuvers nextish, and give a quick run-down on tournament progress up to that date. Detailed game-by-game breakdowns will be published, when match ends, in single issue of TGL, so you'll have a full record all in one 'zine. For this, we still need someone to annotate the games for us--doesn't have to be a brilliant analysis--just a straightforward discussion of game highlights and blunders. (We'd do it ourselves, only we are too rusty after a 10-year layoff from Chess competition.)

From a "Bolieve It Or Not!" panel: Murar Rao, commander of the Mahratta Armies of India (1740-1763) took many thousands of prisoners of war in his campaigns and played a game of Chess with each one; if the prisoner won he was set free; if he lost, he was thrown to his death from the battlements of the fortress! ("Chess fer blood!")
