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In Brief --

This was supposed to be published in December (indeed, pp. 11-22 were typed in Dec.). Unfortunately, we stopped to get out THE WSFA JOURNAL #84, then found our alternate publisher having to leave on a month-long business trip and so had to run off 12 already typed catch-up issues of SOTWJ, and having to type and publish another eight issues of SOTWJ which accumulated while we were running off TWJ #84 and the 12 SOTWJ's. Add to this various projects, illnesses (including an early attack of spring fever, sorting twice through 150,000 / pages of fanzines preparatory to selling half of them, and other assorted problems, and you'll see why we were unable to keep our planned TGL catch-up schedule.... At any rate, this is the 3rd of four planned catchemo double-issues, this time climinating most of the huge stack of accumulated Chess material; next issue, we'll concentrate on our stack of General Games material, and hopefully will also be able to catch back up with the Chess, wargaming, and Diplomacy material which has come in since we started this series of catch-up issues. After that, one double-issue a month until Torr comes out, and after that a combined TG/TGL coming out either monthly or bimonthly, depending on you. ## If we are going to be able to get a combined 'zine out with any regularity, we will need an assured supply of material -- i.e., a group of regular contributors. We especially need a steady supply of covers (suitable for offset reproduction), reviews (games, magazines, books), articles, columns, reports, letters, occasional games, etc. And we could also use an alternate publisher, in case our mimeo should give up the ghost. (When we finish selling our SF collection, we will buy a new typor and go offset -- if we can find a regular offset publisher by that time. Our eye trouble makes it imperative that we find someone else to do the publishing as soon as practicable.) ## If you can help with the combined TG/ TGL in any way, please speak up. We need your help to keep going much longer ...!



Four short articles by Japanese masters, some translated in an amusingly colloquial style. ## Not worth it alone, but a nice lagniappe when you join the AGA to get GO REVIEW (see below).

The Master of Go, by Yasunari Kawabata (Berkley Pub. Co.; NY; Berkley Medallion Book #02645; pb; 8/74; orig. pub. '72 by Alfred A. Knopf, Inc.; \$1.75; 186 / viii pp.; Trans. from the Japanese by Edward G. Seidensticker; cover not credited) -- The novel, "at once elegiac and suffused with life, that Kawabata considered to be his finest work". Although it contains elements of fiction, it is actually "more chronicle than novel, a sad, elegant piece of reportage, based upon a 1938 Go match, the course of which was precisely as described in this 'chronicle-novel', and upon which Mr. Kawabata reported for the twin Osaka and Tokyo newspapers that today both bear the name MAINICHI. . . /in if 'The Invincible Master' lost his final champion-ship match, and at Mr. Kawabata's hands the defeat becomes the defeat of a tradition." ## We haven't read this yet, but a quick look through it reveals numerous diagrams depicting the setting of the board at various points during the match.

Chess, by Edward Lasker (B.T. Batsford, London; '73; hb; 468 / viii pp.; \*\*\*26) \*\*\*
"Using basic teaching methods, Edward Lasker takes the reader from the basic moves right up to the level of a very strong club player. His method of learning, adapted from programmed learning and ideally suited to chess, is the next best alternative to a personal course of tuition from a chess master. It stimulates discussion between master and pupil. . . . " The d.j. blurb says it better than we could. Book contains Preface, sections on "The Rules of the Game", "Checkmating the Lone King", "Combinative Play", "Positional Play", "End-Game Strategy", "Middle-Game Strategy"; and there is a Recapitulation and Index. ## Numerous diagrams and a lucid and direct writing style make this an excellent book for helping the beginner advance to the rank of reasonably competent Chess player. Not as good an instructional tool as the Quadrangle Press book we reviewed here a while back, but still worth-while.

Lanier Graham (Studio Vista, London; '68; a "Collectors' Blue Book"; hb; £1.05; 84 pp.) -- Introduction; Chapters on India, Persia & Arabia, Early Europe, Later Europe, & 20th Century; Conclusion; Selected Bibliography. ## Profusely illustrated in b&w, with many interesting sets we've not seen before (especially interesting were some of the 20th Century sets). Recommended.

Barnes & Co.; pb (this ed. rev. thru Fischer-Spassky Match); \$3; 335 / xv pp.; 131 diagrams, incl. 34 problems) -- A delightful collection of essays and anecdotes on Chess and Chess personalities, / problems, studies, etc. A book which is meant to be enjoyed rather than used! Recommended.

The DERLD, by Leonard M. Pickett (Privately-produced mimeo (cardboard covers)
450-copy limited ed.; '72; 48 / v pp.; \*\$2) --- An analysis of "The Delayed Exchange (Over)

Ruy Lopez Deferred"; w/60 diagrams. A unique and now apparently rare item. Dictionary of Modern Chess, by Byrne J. Horton (Philosophical Library, NY; 159; 224 / xi pp.; regular price unknown (this was remaindered)) -- Over 800 entries, from "Aben-Ezra" thru "Zwischenzug". It's a "paperback original", published as a "large format, fully illustrated" book, in which the author introduces the reader to the world of Chess "through history, anecdote, and folklore". "The game of chess compresses kingdoms and their armies down to a board of sixty-four squares and thirty-two men", states Mr. Hoban, and, "once play is started, the battles waged on the board are as real to the players as those of Agincourt, Waterloo and Gettysburg were to the generals who plotted their strategies". His method consists of reversing the normal procedure, "by introducing the new player to play by way of the end game, so that he has an immediate view of his goal."

UNEECARD CO., P.O. Drawer 956, Wadesboro, NC 28170, sent the following news re-"On September third /19747, Uneecard Company of North Carolina began selling a new game of chess played with cards. ## "The new game, called Checkmate, is played on a shortened chess board with chessmen represented on playing cards. Some interesting new elements of play are introduced, including pawn liberation and the accumulation of points. ## "The inventor, Mr. Robert Billingsley, has formed hiw own company through which the game will be sold. He is hopeful that his game will receive widespread acceptance by chess players and game lovers alike. He says, 'To the best of my knowledge, this is the first time that chess players and card players may compete at the same table.' ## "The game comes in a compact box containing the game board, two small packs of cards, pad and pencil, and complete instructions.
