How to deal with a "blockage" in your 'pan'!

If and when you are ever faced with a block paper do not call in the so called experts like 'Rent'o'kil'. In our experience you will, nine times out of ten, end up tidying up after them anyway, so, you may as well do the job yourself. I suggest you follow these easy step-by-step instructions;

- 1) Give the offending blockage a good solid kick. (This may well hurt your foot, but then, if you feel some pain just think what the pan will be feeling!).
- 2) Next, a couple of buckets of water should be sluiced down the pan. A liberal amount of some kind of cutting agent could be added to the water as an option (caustic soda recommended!).

Bootlicking by Guillaume d'Enfant (or how to escape from Spaniards)

If you have no taste at all (I cite as a typical example the noisesome Catstrangler) you will be able to benefit from the profound experience which I am to relate to you. However if you consider yourself a man of cultured sensibility you have little to learn here, you will have to content yourself with more orthodox methods of escape.
