# Do we want/need a hobby organisation?



# Are You a Diplomatic Fiend? by Nicky Palmer

This quiz is similar in form (but new in content) to a piece I wrote for Diplomacy World 17, which got a friendly reception and has been reprinted two or three times elsewhere. The idea is that Diplomacy is not, primarily, a game of tactics; as a board wargamer I don't really think much of it in that respect. Diplomacy is a game of diplomacy and in my view we should see far more discussion of the diplomatic side of the game than all the reams of opening theory which have always dominated the debate. To put it bluntly, there is little evidence that moving to the North Sea from London makes much difference. to winning chances, but a glance at the playing records of individual players shows that individual style matters quite a lot.

I don't claim to be especially qualified to write this, but as nobody else seems inclined to do so purhaps I can at least stimulate some ideas. You may feel you have better answers than the preferred solution to some of the questions; unfortunately I will have to take solo responsibility for the contest marking, as it's not something you can do by committee, but if you want to accompany entries with persuasive arguments I'll read them with interest - and if this biases the contest to the most plausible rogues, so much the better. Dut please choose one of the alternatives offered for each question or chaos will ensue.

Right. The game is at the start, you are Mussia, and you have been unable to reply to letters due to a prolonged study course at the Macchiavelli School of Writing in Venice. During your absence, the Government has sold the Post Office to 7 Singapore businessmen, and all letters are now routed through Liechtenstein and take two weeks to deliver. Consequently, you have precisely time to send one letter to each opponent. All of them are capable and experienced players. They have written to you as follows, excess verbiage ("I look forward to hearing from you and to a successful alliance") being omitted:

TURKEY, December 27th: In my view, the first two turns are decisive for Turkey, as they determine the future alliance structure in the Balkans. If we can refrain from the customary skirmishes in the Black Sea and I have reasonable luck with Italy, then Winter 1902 will see me in Gre/Dul with my armies and my F moved to Con; I will build A Ank and F Smy, and the "Stemroller alliance" will - as far as I'm concerned - be secure.
