England's refusal to abandon Turkey for Turkish occupation can mean only one thing; England must believe that it can survive with

out the generous graces of Turkey and the Mule.

PARTS Via the good offices of Italy, France has learned of the Great Wall of Geneva. No word had come from Geneva since Fall of 1904, ever a year ago. It appears that the secrecy is partially the result of a lack of ambition, imagination and fortitude, and perhaps a desire to see a quick end to the war in Europe. According to other sources in the East, there is also a possibility that the Swiss have left their long time neutrality in favour of direct intervention. But who is to say? LONDON Please cancel the press release in my previous communication.
