RUSSIA TAKES NORWAY

RUSSO-GERMAN PACT ANNOUNCED

Moscow: The Duma announced the signing of a treaty of alliance with the government of Kaiser Welhelm III. The treaty encompasses the following points:

1. Non-agression

2. Mutual assistance

3. Nuetrality of Prussia and Livonia

4. All provinces South of Denmark and West of the German Eastern border will be considered in the German sphere of influence.

5. All provinces North of Denmark, enclusive of the British Isles, and East of the German Eastern Frontier will be considered in the Russian sphere of influence.

6. Exceptions: The sovereignty of the Italian provinces will be

sacred to all parties to this alliance.

7. Any act of agression against any party to this alliance will be considered an act of war to all parties to this alliance.

Bellegarde, Poictesme, France (21 December 1901): Yesterday I visited 1'Anse, that little cove near Manneville which figures so prominently in the history of this province. The hillside around the Shrine of the Redemption of Poictesme was filled with confident, voluble Poictumaise who spoke with every expectation of victory as they watched units of the new Second Fleet pass in review before Vice-Admiral Bertran de Fomor, Seignuer de Belpaysage Le Bas.

Naturally, the disposition which will be made of this new fleet is a naval secret. But speculation is rife that France will take advantage of the blunders of Ifalian and Austre-Hungarian policy to establish French supremacy in the Mediterranean. There are rumers of a French alliance with Turkey against Italy and Austria-Hungary, although Turkish forces seem at this moment to be poised on the

vulnerable southern flank of the Russian Empire.

Geneva papers received in this isolated province report a curious cryptogram which the Russian secret service has found among the effects of an alleged French spy. The encoded message was included in the newspaper report, and the habitues of Bellegarde's many cafes are amusing themselves this afternoon by trying their luck in deciphering it. I found it to be a relatively easy transposition cipher with some enciphering errors. It reads:

'March on Sevastopol. Attack Ukraina. The bear has sores as he is lame. Victory is ours."

Curiously enough, the t5anspositions seem based vaguely on the English avocation of change-ringing, in which I was once instructed by a local sexton while visiting the quiet Lincolnshire town of Fenchurch St. Pauls. But the changes do not follow the rules, and as a consequence I am uncertain of the translation of the third sentence of the message.

My gloomy friend Pere de Perdigon, the local priest of Storisende, expressed dismay at the report of the Turkish alliance. "No good can come from a heathen alliance with our Christian nation," he sighed. "Or," he corrected himself, "our mostly Christian nation. To too many of my parishoners, this is the season not of the Nativity but of the Feast of the Wheel."

Underlined moves do not succeed. The A-H fleet was already in Triste so the move was impossible. As Paris does not border on the Ruhr the series of moves attempting to place the A Paris in the Ruhr are illegal. Perhaps the French High Command was attempting to use some of the captured German transport balloons? The Russian army in Budapest must

retreat. The only retreat possible is to Galicia. The A Budapest will retreat to Galicia.

In issur #4 of TRANTOR Russia was permitted to build three units, two new units for the captured supply centers of Sweden and Budapest and one unit to replace the fleet annihilated in Rumania.
