When news reached the commander of the second Fleet concerning the fighting in northern Italy, the Admiral pointed it out to his staff as another example of the idiocies of landsmen. "The Second Army had no chance to keep the Italians out of Piedmont this autumn," he guffawed. "Then the heroes of the pizza parlor sent their army from the Tyrol into Piedmont against us, and ordered their other army to support the army that was still in the Tyrol. A fine muddle, my friends."

The Aimiral's humor may be rather heavy-handed, but the fact remains - the fantastically inept handling of Italian forces, which has continued since the beginning of the war, has been an unexpected blessing upon French arms. This is all the more curprising because the Italian chief of staff has the reputation of a man will skilled

in the tactics of international war.

The consensus of opinion in the Second Fleet is that this power-ful striking force will not turn to aid the Second Army in the Piedmont, but will instead join the First in an attack on the undermanned and mutinous Italian Fleet.
