FRANCE NEAR COLLAPSE AFTER PROLONGED INACTIVITY

Underlined moves do not succeed. The Italian Fleet English Channel may retreat to Wales, the Irish Sea, Brest, or off the board. This retreat should accompany the "Fall 1906" moves, which may be made conditional upon its direction. The Turkish Army Sevastapol is retreated to Armenia. The Turkish player has until the next deadline to exercise his option to remove rather than retreating.

MOVE ANALYSIS France's continued failure to move has seriously endangered his position, and taken considerable pressure off of Germany. Should Latimer's country remain in civil disorder for any length of time he will certainly be reduced by Germany. This will probably end Turkey's hopes as well as his own, and will finish the "little powers" of England and Italy in the bargain.

Meanwhile, Germany has finally maneuvered into a position to retake Berlin, though he will have to guard against the Italians who are menacing the Low countries and, if they retreat to Wales or the Irish Sea, Liverpool.

Russia has, temporarily at least, achieved an impregnable position around Sevastapol. He cannot, however, prevent Turkey from taking Galicia this Fall, putting Zelazny into position to cut

Ukraine's support and taken Sevastapol once more.

Austria, meanwhile, apparently without an ally, can only hope to hold on to Trieste for one more year, and possibly keep his fleet by taking Venice.

SMOKE GREENEGRASS, THE POT YOU SAVE MAY BE YOUR OWN!!!

ST. PEERIGRAD After a meeting here today CASG Enterprises announced the establishment of a 200 billion dollar amusement park here to be known as DIPLOMACYLAND. The founders of the park, Howard Hughes, J. Paul Getty, Baron Rothschild, Aristotle Onassis, and David Rockefeller, announced Pablo Peericelli would serve as master designer of the park. More than 30 billion dollars has been initially programmed for the project.

Peericelli announced the first section of the park would open soon. Among sections announced thus far are YESTERDAYLAND, BOREDOMLAND, CITYLAND, FAIREYLAND, GREENELAND, NEVERMORELAND, and SOCKITTOMELAND.

Rumors that another park near Peeris was being planned were denied but speculation continues that another Park, DIPLOMACYLESSLAND will soon appear there continue.

YESTERDAYLAND

We are pleased to present part of an interview with Dr. and Mrs. Will Durant, technical consultants to CASH Enterprises for the Yesterdayland protion of Diplomacyland. The Durants are well known for their series on the history of the western world which last month entered its 143rd volume, Charlotte of Luxembourg and Henri of Andorra: A Study in Power Politics.

The Durants have been responsible for the historical accuracy of Diplomacyland's largest park, which is devoted to great events of the past. They have supervised a staff of some 132,000 which has labored for seven years to construct this single part of the park. More than 2 billion dollars has been spent so far and only 13 of the projected 31 exhibits are finished. Talking of the completed portions of Yesterdayland, Will Durant said:

"All of the events we selected were of great historical importance and many involved the use of thousands of extras and the construction of great masses of elaborate settings. However, Hughes Tool Company did all the mechanical work and Onassis helped in the shipping aspects of the two Mutinies and Titanic. I think Peericelli did a great job in designing the Bikini Test which was our greatest technical feat. However, each of the attractions has some information about them which would be most useful to readers.

KING OF KINGS: This F coupon attraction features a very realistic crucifixion in which the patron has his choice of playing either Judas, Christ, or the Roman centurion. We imported the original Golgotha from Jerusalem with the permission of the Israeli Government and designed the sets around those used in the movie. As patrons enter the first trial is in progress and the rest of the attraction pretty much follows Biblical lines. In our premier showing Eugene McCarthy played Judas, George Romney the Christ, and Curtis LeMay the Centurion. This attraction is not recommended for those with weak stomachs.

BEN-HUR: Features an E coupon attraction and consists of 32 people in chariots racing around an arena with Ralph Nader calling the action from the watchtower. Losers are immediately fed to the lions after the race and the winner is given a free entry ticket to Indianapolis. This is a very popular attraction with the younger kids who dig the chariots. Chariots are designed to resemble Mustangs, Cougars, VW's, Cadillacs, MG's, and Ramblers. Thus far in 42 races the following winners have come out:

BURNING OF ROME: This A coupon attraction allows the patron to put a torch to Rome and watch the city burn while the Rome Symphony plays "The Firebird Suite" of Stravinsky.

BURNING OF ACRE: This B coupon attraction features the Christians' attempts to take Acre from the Turks during the Crusades. In our early exhibits the Turks won most of the time but by adding a special miracle or two the Christians now win almost 95% of the time. We cast Charles Turner as the chief of the Christians and Rod Walker as the head Turk in the first performance. However, just at the climactic moment a power failure hit the setting and almost electrocuted everybody. Fortunately, Brian Bailey had his can of Holy Water and Roland Tzudiker his prayer shawl so both put the fire out in rapid time.

MUTINY ON THE BOUNTY: Our popular F coupon exhibit consists of a cruise around the artificial lake and then a re-enactment of the famed mutiny. We have John Boardman cast as Captain Blight and Bill Linden as Christian Fletcher.

THE BASTILLE: This A coupon attraction features the storming of the Bastille and the hanging of Ronald Reagan in effigy. However, we usually find some retired Hollywood star willing to stand in for Ronnie and make a few bucks. This attraction is one of our most popular, though some Californians claim the Bastille' looks a lot like the administration building at the University of California campus at Berkeley. No one has ever explained how Reagan ended up in the Bastille, though Stan Delaplane claims he heard that Reagan was to appear in a remake of "The Man in the Iron Mask" shortly before he was assassinated.

GONE WITH THE WIND: This E coupon attraction features many scenes from Margaret Mitchell's famed novel. We cast John Boardman as Rhett Buttler and Margaret Gemignani as Scarlett O'Hara, but that didn't work out as well as we'd hoped. Course they sure did put on one whale of a fight scene. Finally we cast Totie Fields as Scarlett and John McCallum as Rhett. That worked fairly well. The big scene is the burning of Atlanta, which always goes over big.

THE TITANIC: This C coupon attraction features the famed ship's collision with the iceberg and the subsequent sinking. We loose quite a few people in this one but the crowds seem to enjoy

watching it. Not too long ago the whole thing was spoiled when MGM's Voyage of the Pueblo film-shooting crew appeared in the middle of the rescue scene. Just didn't look right with all them gunboats running around shooting up people.

DR. ZHIVAGO: This D coupon attraction is a real favorite especially since we cast Jack Greene as Zhivago and started changing leading women every night (we had to). None of them would work with him more than one night. No shortage of volunteers, however. The sleigh ride is a big hit, as is the winter vacation at Varykino. The local Minutemen keep picketing but we don't mind as long as they don't try to stop the people from getting in. Casting Gene Prosnitz as Pasha and John Koning as Komarovsky was genius.

THE CAINE MUTINY: This A coupon attraction features Greg Long as Ensign Pulver and Dough Beyerlein as the nutty captain. However, the cost of replacing palm trees and fresh strawberries makes this a very expensive attraction to operate.

BIKINI TESTING: This very popular attraction has Frankie Avalon running around the Bikini atoll carrying a sign saying BRUSH YOUR TEETH FOR BETTER HYGIENE while Howard Hughes tries to stop the government from testing a P-bomb over the atoll. Conrad von Metzke plays an excellent Secretary of Peace while Hal Naus as Secretary of War and Lou Curtiss as President are top supporting actors. Annette Funicello plays the bomb.

GENEVA: Our very own B attraction has a summit meeting in progress as the world waits for WW III to start. Sid Cochran, Jr. plays the Russian premier and Buddy Tretick the American President. However, the best role belongs to Dan Brannan, who plays the wishy-washing ("wishy-washing"???) Secretary-General of the UN. The attraction ends with a flash-back to March AFB where John Beshara is taking off in his B-70 while the Mormon Tabernacle Choir sings Hava Nagela.

CHICAGO 1968: Features a full length election campaign and PARTY ((heh heh)) Convention. Four party factions fight it out for control of the Whoopeedo Party. The Rightests, Leftists, Moderates and Do-Nothings each seek the nomination of their candidates. Thus far the Rightists have nominated Charles Reinsel twice, while a group of Leftists have nominated Terry Kuch four times, and the Do-Nothings have nominated James Dygert six times. The Moderates have yet to nominate anyone.

"This brief capsule of all our existing attractions shows the wide variety we have and in the future we plan even greater attractions: THE SCORPION VS THE THRESHER, A MARCH ON MEMPHIS, THE MAN FROM FIDELITY LIFE INSURANCE, APOLLO 69, METS VS YANKEES, AND METROLOPITAN OPERA HITS. But time is needed to achieve the technical perfection Peerieelli demands so we are taking our time to create these masterpieces."

ST. PEERIGRAD (1 January 1906) Observers here regard it as significant that a key to the city was pre-

sented to the Russian ambassador as part of the New Year's Honors celebration. Also noted was the naming of the main thoroughfare of St. Peerigrad as John Smythii Avenue...
