3. There are several games in Everything #13 that do need some attention as to how to rate them, and just general interest. They will also be listed on the ballot. 1977CS: In many reting systems published in the past, the drawing powers had to have as many or more centers as those not in the draw Here, a civil disorder France had 9 centers and was left out, though a S center Germany was in. In this case, the French player (ms; what fun that game wasn't!) resigned after the last move played in that game; no move was played without him, the players just drew in the next game; no ter the game was orphaned. In that case, France was never tachnically in disorder, and the French player might receive a part in the draw. (Greedy mes actually it's not that, it's just the principle behind the thing.)
