
(Constantinople UPI) (1, Feb., 1901) Walli de Bench-al-Pillsburi, Sultan of Turkey has today been pois oned by his nephew and heir-apparent, Barri-Dal-Gold The Sultan is on his deathbed and calls for vengeance, asking that his friend, the Czar of all the Russias, punish the usurper and restore the throne to the royal family in the person of the Sultan's daughter, Zhai-ee-Van-Ben Bernecki-Pillsburi.

(2, February, 1901) Bill-al-Shillings-et-Pence, former Grand Vizier of Turkey, has been beheaded for treason. Investigations into the death of the Sultan's dearly beloved uncle, the late Walli de Bench-al-Pillsburi, have shown that the royal cook mistook a container of slow acting poison sometimes used on prisoners, In view of the strictly accidental nature of the for the salt container. tragedy, the cook has been returned to his former position with a strict warning to lable all food containers more clearly in the future.

Turkey extends the hand of peace to all. The Sultan said in an exclusive interview, "Although I am young, I have been trained to lead my country, and I do not suffer from the usual rashness of youth. It is better that my people should have peace and be content with what we have than that we should be greedy and plunge all of Europe into war." The Sultan's cousin, Zhai-ee-Van-ben-Bernecki-Pillsburi, has agreed to marry him in order to reunite the lines of descent and avoid civil strife.

(21, Feb., 1901) Turkey agrees to all offers of treaties of friendship offered to her. We have no desire for war and will do all we can to avoid such a catastrophe in Europe.

Today we received, via special courier, a note from the (8. March, 1901) Czar of Russia, declaring war on Turkey. The Czar is obviously taking advantage of our recent accesion to the throne and of our relative youth to gain his selfish ends. All Europe stands witness to the violence Russia 'as done to the hope for peace in our time. It is hoped that this foul deed will not go unanswered.

SAWICZEWSKI APOLOGIZES!

(Berlin) The German Republic extends its public thanks to the Polish Republic for honoring the Mutual Defense Treaty of 1899.

This action, taken even before a request by the German government, is in marked contrast to the perfidious treachery of the dogs of Albion, worhty sucessors to the barbarian Drake.

As a token of thanks, the state of East Prussia is hereby conveyed to the Polish Republic. The German government must warn Turkey that the Mutual Defense Treaty also binds Germany. Further attack on Poland will force the German Republic to take appropriate action.

Emperor Johannes Wolfgangus I made public an Imperial decree in which
he declared a massive tree-planting program for the city of Linz, whose greenery
was devastated last winter by an invasion of "evil bacteria from a far-away land"
The Emperor was not too careful about insinuating that the "far-away land" was
less far away than might be thought.

(Warszawa) Dr. Andrzej Sawiczewski, President of the Polish Republic, today announced that the invading Polish second army in Galicia was being withdrawn from Austria and the declaration of war against that nation was being fully renounced.

"We badly misjudged Austrian intentions," stated Sawiczewski squirmingly.
"I am extremely embarrassed by our actions," he added colourfully; and went on
to praise Emperor Franz Joseph's "honourable, humane, and fully justifiable
occupation of the lower Balkans." Sawiczewski spent a full eighteen minutes
tharty four and one half seconds apologizing for the Polish attack and noting
that "no Austrians were ever killed and only a relatively small amount of
property damaged." In reference to the latter, it was noted that an indemnity
of 1 billion zlotys was being paid to Switzerland to be forwarded to the
Austrian government.

Plugawy also announced the postponement of the occupation of East Prussia untill "the first snows fall on the Tatries." In pointing out that this expression was "pirated" from certain New World politicians, a French newsman in the audience ran the terrible risk of being beheaded by an enraged President. Fortuantely, President Sawiczewski was calmed with an all-day lollipop before serious damage resulted.



My Dear M. Cartier:

Things are fine in Mt Idy All is quiet in Vienna these days. It is, however, a quiet of waiting, as though expecting some dreadful calamity. The failure of the Vicegerent ot announce the terms of the treaty which one must assume exists between the Empire and Italy, the sudden apparent distrust on the part of Turkey, the failure of the Armed Forces to move, and of course the serious illness of His Imperial Majesty which is now entering its second year -- all these things add up to a total which is somewhat more than the average citizen wishes to contemplate.

Later: An aide has just brought the terrible news! Franz-Josef is dead! He succumbed to his mysterious illness two nights ago, despite heroic efforts to save his life. Physicians from as far away as the United States made use of every medical technique known; indeed, all declared it little short of miraculous that His Majesty was able to cling to life as long as he did. Little is known about the disease and no details have been made public, except that the original physician in charge, a local gentleman much given over to superstition but nevertheless adjudged quite capable, fell victim to the strange malady himself, and died the previous evening. But the subject depresses me oddly, and there are other matters you would wish to be informed of.

Of course, what will happen when the new Emperor takes charge of the government is uncertain, but Schmidt-Nagy, Graf von Pesth, who has been acting as Vicegerent, will probably be continued in office as Prime Minister. Despite the adventure of the Polish army into Galicia, he has kept the Empire at peace; his handling of the Polish situation has been hailed by all as daring and successful. Italy appears to be allied quite solidly, at present. Turkey seems to have lost confidence in von Pesth's policies lately, but I feel sure the Vicegerent of continued in office, will be able to handle the situation quite competently. And Germany is at present totally committed to the north and west.

I suppose you would be highly interested in some of the diplomatic machinations taking place among the nations surrounding the empire; however, it is not in the interests of this nation to permit public knowledge of the amount and nature of the diplomatic secrets which are available to it.

Later: Perhaps I should discard this letter and begin again at a later date. Things are happening entirely too quickly for me to be able to keep up with them. Altho I realize you are holding your presses waiting for my news, I have had to stop writing for several hours to collect my wits. After the shock of the news of the death of His Imperial Majesty, I received the further shock of seeing him in person not three hours ago. The sun had just set, when I became aware of a presence in the room behind me. Turning around, I found the Emperor himself looking at me as the stuyding me. I was struck utterly speechless, as the paralyzed. He smiled an odd smile and said "No, my boy, I am quite definitely not dead." I then explained to him the nature of this letter, and he told me that he intended to retain von Pesth as Vicegerent, in view of the excellent job he has been doing in the capacity, so you have that much to report as certainty at least.
