(Constantinople) The Turkish Liberation Forces now stationed in Bulgaria are herewith ordered to free the Greek peoples from the tyrranny of the

(London: AP) The Admiralty has taken over the government and has declared Martial Law. The Admiralty is destroying all records and burning all supply depots near London. In a fiery speech, the King declared war on Russia, Germany, Italy, Turkey, and Austria-Hungary.

The people of London are taking the crisis in stride. Merchants are listing prices in marks as well as pounds, anticipating a German landing.

(Wales: AP) The entire British government is being relocated in Wales. The ex-Minister of Defense was sentenced to five years hard labor for incompetence. As he was led out of court, he was quoted as saying, "'Twill be the safest place, as I won't have to dodge German bullets -- besides, I'll make a fortune in the Black Market." Several admirals have sent letters to the ex-Minister suggesting a pardon could be arranged in exchange for stock in the ex-Minister's newly formed company, "Black Market Inc."

(Nilero, Norway AP) The Norwegian underground has pledged to assist England retake Norway. Terrorist groups are beginning to damage Russian morale and supply lines.

(Berlin - German Information Office) The German Republic, shocked by the treachery and perfidy of the so-called "Turkish Republic" and saddened by, as is all Europe, the ruthless suppression of Nationalist Patriotic elements among its subject peoples of Bulgaria and Rumania has withdrawn its recognition of Talaat Bey.

Sultan Abd Al Amid's son who had fled to Armenia has arrived in Berlin to set up a government in exile. Sultan Abd Al Pasha has been recognized by the German Republic.

Military operations to restore the Sultan to the Throne that is rightfully his will consist only of supplying the guerilla forces of Armenia untill the threat to the Fatherland from England is defeated.

All assets of Turkey have been frozen and allocated to the Sultan Abd Al Pasha.

In retaliation for the English attack upon the German fishing fleet in the Helgoland Bight, the German Fleet has been ordered to seek out and destroy all English commerce in the North Sea. The Fleet is under orders to proceed to an unknown destination, but informed speculation is that the English capital may yet know the might of the German Republic.

(Holland INS) Queen Wilhelma welcomed the German forces dispatched to Holland to prevent another sneak attack such as that of England last year. The Queen pledged full support in the German campaign to restore peace in the low countries and announced that the Netherlands army would take the field with Germany.

The move:

England

Army Liverpool to Yorkshire Fleet Edinburgh to the Norwegian Sea Fleet London to the North Sea

In attack this move possesses the following advantages:

- 1. Every neutral supply center reachable from England in 1901, namely Norway, Denmark, Holland, & Belgium, is under threat of immediate attack.
- 2. The attack on any of these can be delivered in two distinct ways, either by fleet or by convoyed army. In the case of Norway, the most usual opening conquest, the attack can be made by any one of three forces.

In defence:

- 1. Every home supply center is protected by the one army.
- 2. The North Sea Fleet is a direct protection against Germany and a potential protection against France.
- 3. Should French hostility develop, an attack at the back-door, Mid Atlantic to Irish Sea, the Norwegian Sea fleet can counter by moving to the North Atlantic.

Strategically and Diplomatically this move gives maximum possibilities as it permits the main campaign to be directed either into the Scandinavian area or to the Low countries. Moreover it does this without giving provocation to France, the most immediate neighbour. At the same time adequate defence his provided against a suprise attack by France: Passive defence of either of the threatened supply centers is provided by the army in Yorkshire. Active defence is supplied by the North Sea Fleet if the attack is a frontal one and by the Norwegian Sea Fleet if it is indirect towards Liverpool.

The most usual move is army to Edinburgh. In this move the question is still left open, to be decided after the first half year's developments on the diplomatic and military fronts the army can be used offensively; alternatively, both fleets can be used as striking arms with the army acting as a defending force. It is this flexibility which is the most attractive feature of this move. The main strategic decisions, whether to direct the main attack against Scandinavia or the Low Countries, and whether, if necessary, it should be the army or the fleet which defends, need not be made until Fall, after the other players opening moves are studied and further diplomatic action has taken place.

1. Fleet Edinburgh to the Norwegian Sca

a/ in the case of the fleet in the North Sea due to unexpected contingencies (or opportunities) being unable to take Norway; this fleet can do so.

- b/ in the case of war with Russia, the fleet will be in position to Support the army into Norway. or move to the Barents Sea, to capture St. Petersburg.
- c/ in the fall capture Norway if the army or other fleet is needed in the south
- 2. Fleet London to the North Sea
 - a/ the fleet will be in position to threaten, with capture by the fleet or by convoyed army, the supply center of Belgium, Holland, Denmark, or Norway
 - b/ in case of war with Russia, the fleet will be in position to convoy the army to Norway or move to Skagerrak, thereby putting pressure on Sweden
 - c/ in case of war with Germany, the fleet will be in position to: i Capture either Belgium, Holland, or Denmark or at least prevent such capture by Germany.
 - ii Move to the Skagerrak, thereby applyinggpressure on Denmark, especially for the Fall 1902.
 - iii Move to the Helgoland Bight, thereby applying pressure on Denmark, Kiel, and Holland.
 - d/ in case of war with France, the fleet will be in position to:
 - i protect against an attempt by France to capture London
 - ii capture Belgium by convoying an army or by fleet action or at least preven Belgium's capture by France.
 - iii Support a new fleet built in London to the Channel.
- 3. Army Liverpool to Yorkshire. This puts the army in position to be convoyed to Norway, Denmark, Holland, or Belgium by the fleet in the North SEa.

This brings one fleet to Norway, and the other if it proves essential; it allows for an army convey to any possible place; it protects London from the French; and it sets the North S a fleet up as a balance of power unit between the French and Germans in negotiating for Belgium. And it doesn't antagonise a soul. Except for SPECIFIC UNORTHO DOX LITERNATIVE MANOEUVRES called for by a war situation or similar happening, this seems the only sensible move - wrapping up the advantages neatly without including the possible detriments.
