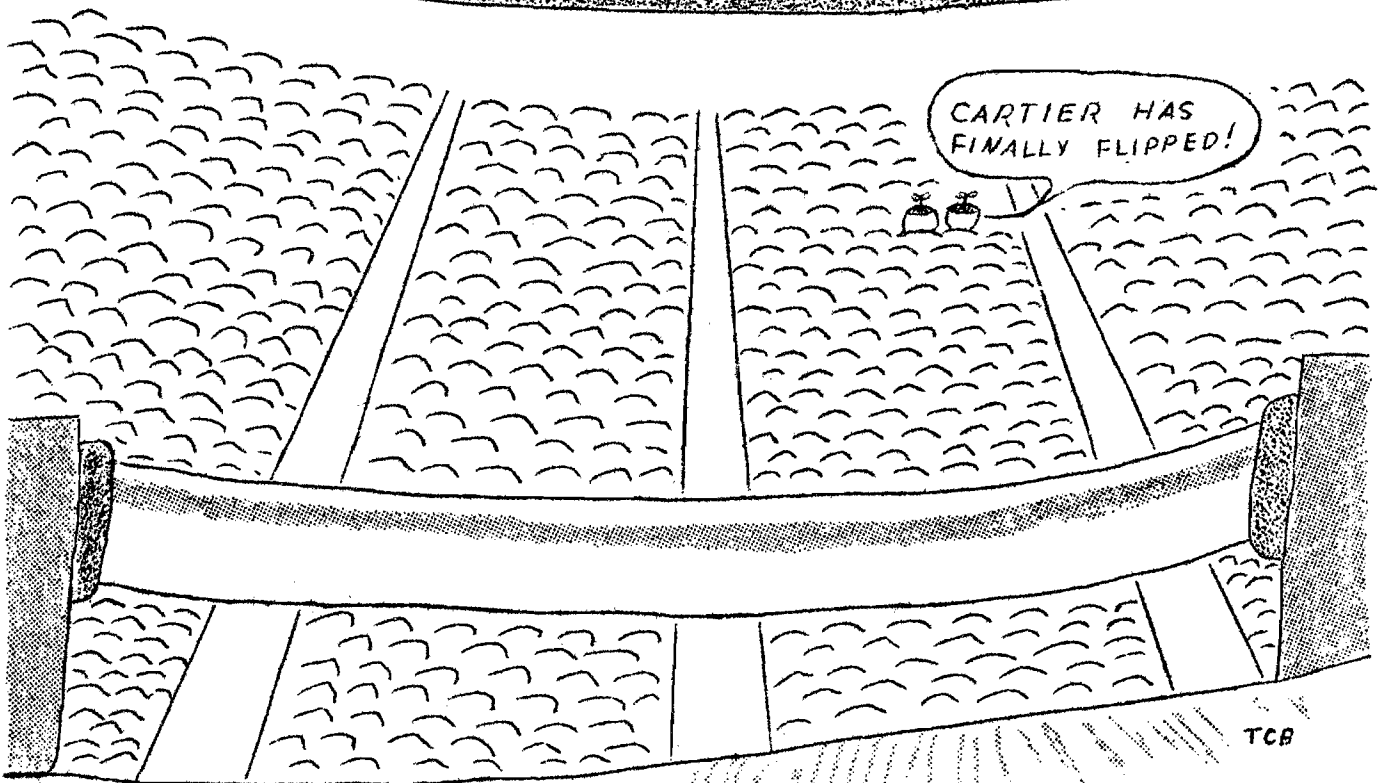
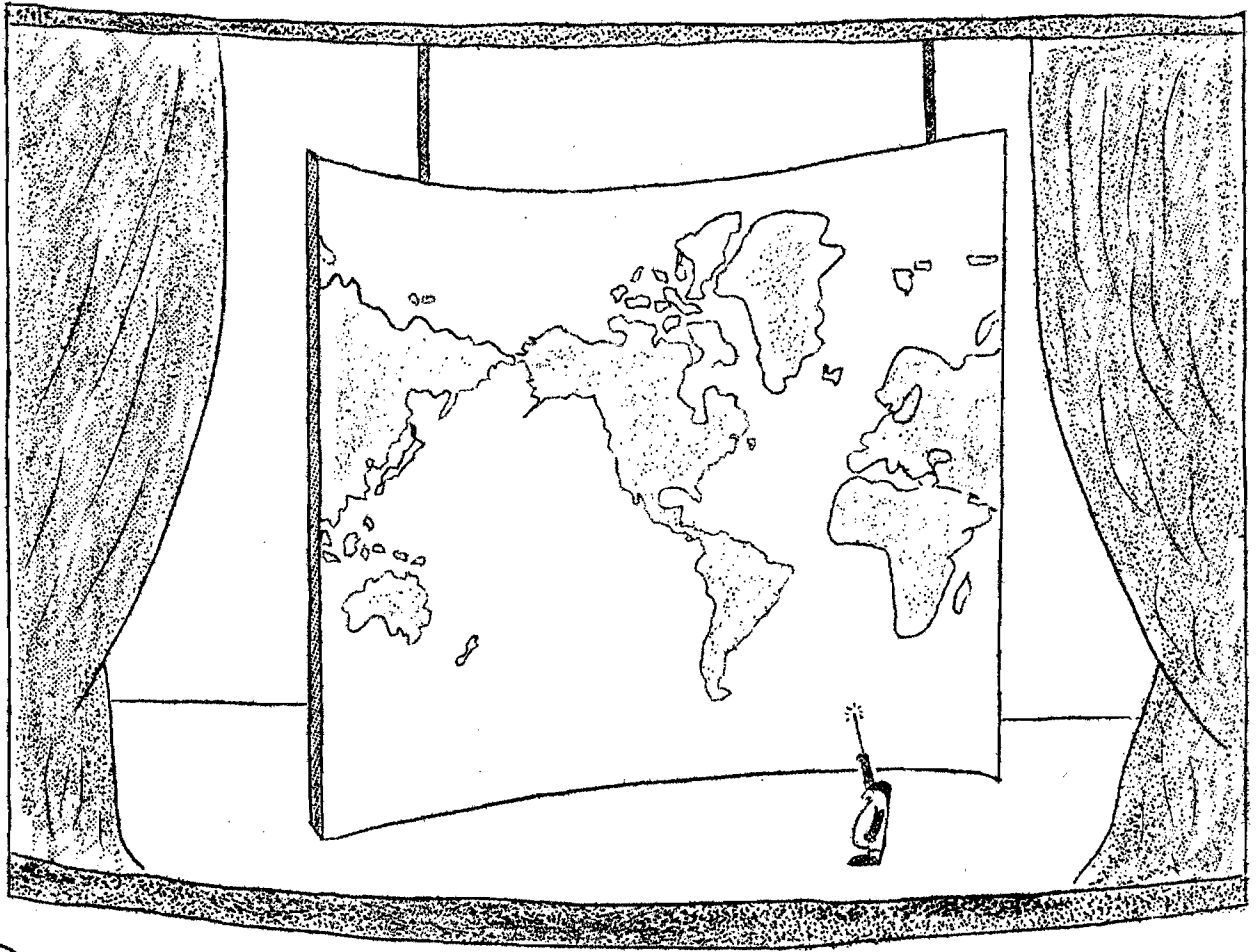

WILD 'N WOOLY UNDER ATTACK!

A heavy artillery barrage is being zeroed in on us from both BROBDINGNAG in the Wilds of Alberta and the LONELY MOUNTAIN in the Wilds of Shaker Heights. Heaven knows from where else the attacks may come.

We're under a seige far more dreadful than the time von Metzke allied with the THRUSH against us in Los Angeles.

The very first page of the rulebook states that the first player to gain a majority of the units on the board is the winner. Why? then, do I defy the terrible might of two of the deadliest gamesmasters and/or players, Wells and McCallum? Why will Wild 'n Wooly declare the first player with 18 supply centers the winner?

This is a good question, of course, but not a pertinent question in most games since the player who first obtains 18 supply centers will usually be the same player who first obtains a majority of the units on the board. The difference in rulings will effect when the game ends rather than who is the winner. We doubt if anyone is worried about that aspect of it.

What does concern all the players is the possibility of different players gaining a majority of units and the 18 supply centers. Either circumstance could happen first.

Let us consider an example:

You are playing Austria-Hungary and I am playing Turkey. We co-operated against Russia first and then Germany putting them both out of the game. Then, while you and France were dividing Italy, I stabbed the two of you in the back and soon both France and Italy were out of the game. I have taken the Balkans and kept Vienna, Trieste, and Budapest under some kind of attack or threat of attack ever since. England has sided with you and owns England and the three Scandinavian countries. I own Warsaw, Moscow, Sevastopol, Turkey, and the Balkans. You own the rest, all 18 supply centers from Portugal to St. Petersburg. One English fleet is supporting St. Petersburg for you. The rest have forced me back out of the Ionian. However, because, you have been forced to occupy your home supply centers, you have only 4 units on the board. If I just blew up an English fleet in Syria on a Spring move, I will have a majority of units, ten in all, 7 fleets and 3 armies.

The example is close to a real game and is intended to describe how a central power, such as Germany or Austria could be discriminated against with the rulebook's majority of units rule. The central powers almost always have their home supply centers under seige from one direction while English and Turkish supply centers (especially a large growing England or Turkey) are seldom attacked. This can seriously slow down the building of units by the central powers. If, in spite of being under seige, a central power can take 18 supply centers anyway, I feel that they have proven superior Diplomatic ability and should be declared the winner.

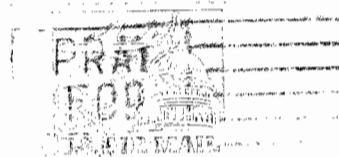
