

Winter 1905: My thanks to Don Horton and Andrew Phillips for sending stand-by orders. Pete Weber wishes to continue play, and I have now heard from George Inzer, who also wishes to keep his position. LA GUERRE'S LRT is now reconstituted with all of the original four survivors. Bob Wilson's ZIP is 92706, by the way.

Speaking of Bob Wilson. Thomas Luke Wilson was the player of record for Austria in this game. Somewhere in 1901 or 1902 he resigned or was dropped. Does anyone remember what...and when? There is no indication I can find in the printed issues of LA GUERRE. Any information on when and

how Tom was replaced by Bob would be very much appreciated.

SPRING 1906 ORDERS are due on Thursday, 2 March 1972. I have orders on hand for France and Italy.
