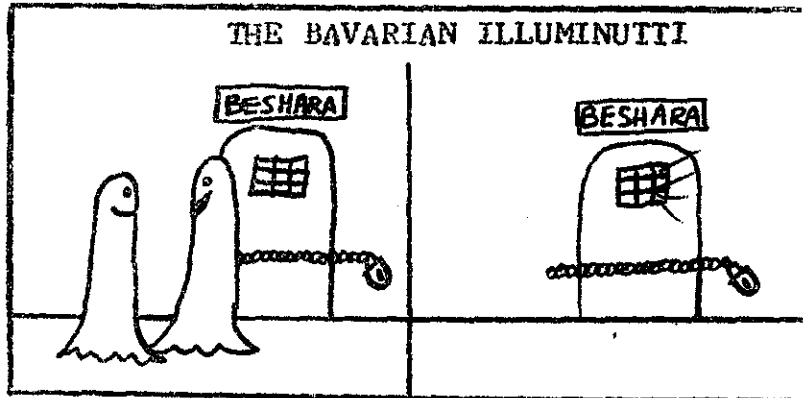


# WILE 'N' WORRY

## 1970AE -- MAYBE WE SHOULD HAVE STOOD IN BED

Summer 1906 (again): I have heard from Tom Wilson, who sends along a surprising document. A copy of Fall 1905 moves for this dog published by Tretick. It appears on a "page 4" of a "Volume V, Number 11", dated in May 1971. Problem: There is a 4-page V.11, consisting entirely of verbiage and no games, dated in April. V.12 is dated in July. When I published the S05 positions to restart the game, I asked if there were any additional seasons. Apparently none of you got this mysterious "V.11, p.4" or you forgot about it, or something. As things stand, it is now too late to replay the game (the results of the Tretick F05 were substantially the same as the same season played in WNW 29). The best thing at this point is simply to proceed.

OK--I have not heard from Bob Wilson. However, the rightful owner of the position, Tom Wilson, is anxious to play the position. He is now Austria. France is still George Inzer. Italy is still Len Lakofka. Pete Weber failed to respond a second time and is dropped. He is replaced by Don Horton, whose address appears in WNW #33, which also indicates the Spring 1906 orders. Please note correction and retreat in #34.

FALL 1906 ORDERS are due on Thursday, 15 June 1972. I already have orders for France and Italy.

Let me add one final word. We now have only 3 original players. Let's try to keep it there, please?

## 1972D -- NAVAL WARFARE LOOMS IN WEST

SPRING 1902 ORDERS are due on Thursday, 15 June 1972.

Special notice: Len Lakofka is interested in writing an occasional commentary on this game. His S01 comments have already been printed. I have his F01 comments and W01 predictions (interesting!) on hand. The question is, should I print them. Len is very generous to volunteer his services in this way, but I don't want to proceed further without consulting the players. Some players feel that game commentary, especially in close proximity to the moves commented on, may influence the course of the game. I believe this can happen in some instances, although Diplomacy players are generally such independent cusses that they are led by their own lights and are little influenced by outside comment. However, I want to be fair. If any player objects to the printing of commentary, I will not do so. You have until the Spring 1902 deadline (15 June) to object. No objections will be entertained after that date. I ask you to keep this in mind: Len is a good game commentator, and what he writes is worth reading, even if you don't agree with it. If his comments influence the game, they may just as easily influence it to your benefit as to your detriment. I personally would prefer to print the commentary, but, to repeat, I won't if anyone objects by the 15 June deadline.

#### 1972W -- NO MOVES, JUST PRESS

LONDON (April 1901): His Majesty's First Minister, Sir William Gallstone, has announced the breaking of diplomatic relations with Germany. "Really, the Kaiser has gone daft! First we are to attack France immediately, then Russia, Austria, and Turkey on the next move, and Italy in 1902. He did, however, suggest that German forces might, under the right circumstances, come to our aid 'if diplomatically and physically possible.'" In exchange, we, of course, must support the barbarian Huns into Belgium. I wonder if anyone in Europe has accepted such an offer?"

KOBLENZ (17 March 1901): The father of the huge steel and armaments empire, KRAPP, AG., was the honored speaker last night at an annual dinner given by the Rheinland Association of Better Bankers. Baron Harold von Krapp was generally optimistic in his assessment of the world situation, and the future of steel and armaments industries. Said vonKrapp: "We can most assuredly look forward to a boom, as far as our business is concerned--our future is tied irrevocably to the future of Germany." The Baron von Krapp's speech was enthusiastically cheered and applauded by the audience of middle-aged, fat, cigar-smoking bankers.

SAARBRUCKEN (14 February 1901): The head of the multi-billion mark oven and steel manufacturing company of I.G.FARRBEEN, AG., was interviewed today by the magazine KAPITAL DEUTSCHLANDS. Among the more pertinent views expressed by Raulf Erwin Bachstabber was: "...guns or butter? Why not butter our guns? If we have guns and butter we can butter our guns, and eat them too." Herr Bachstabber was seen leaving in an exultant mood. Said the interviewer, "I was somewhat confused, but I must emphasize I was deeply impressed!"
