WARSAW: Premier Andrej Sawiczewski has given one of his infrequent interviews, seated in one of the Russian infantry trenches on the Polish-German frontier. The booming of nearby cannon punctuated his sentences. "We have no intention of invading Germany, although we have every moral right to do so. The slow encrustation of Russian highways with those atrocious Volkscycles most certainly warrants some kind of drastic action. There are more foreign cycles in Russia than there are Russian cycles! However, we are merely going to go make sure that the Germans don't gain an inch of ground here, so that they will eventually go down to their bitter reward."

SEMUR-EN-AUXOIS (5 December 1902): Le Directeur du Deuxième Bureau, Richard Ferrous, has ordered all vagrants, radicals, and critics of the Spanish clergy to be arrested. Reliable sources say that Maurice Mendes-France (FMDB) has been appointed Military Governor of Valencia state. General Roland Claude-Killy is marching with the Madrid garrison of the French Southern Army, and other troops are occupying all routes north along the coast. From field reporters we hear that a major battle will probably erupt just east of Albuete in the Ugar river valley.

BARCELONA (10 December 1902): A flotilla from the II (Languedoc) Fleet anchored outside this city's harbor is expected to dominate any enemy approaches along the coastal routes to Barcelona. Other detachments will make for the Balearic Islands and Valencia in pursuit of the claimant Lucretia, anti-Pope Joan II.

PARIS (12 December 1902): Cardinal Clichy, in an emotional address in Notre Dame, called down punishment on the Princess Lucretia, Emilleno Lusagna, Count Ritorno Vincetore, and their underlings. "Our neighbor, Italy, is aware of the danger from these revolutionaries and will, God willing, co-operate to rid ourselves of these criminals. Blessed be the Pope." He added that Monsieur le President is assured that these revolutionaries, romantic though they be, will suffer for their sins and iniquities.

PALMA (13 December 1902): The arrival of elements of the French fleet here in the Balearics was greeted by very popular enthusiasm today. Princess Lucretia herself greeted the commander of the battleship *Lagelle*, Francois Clappe, Duc de Bourbon-Lec. Commander Clappe immediately went into private audience with Her Majesty. An hour later, Commander Clappe breathlessly announced shore leave for all hands, commencing at the time, 33 minutes before.

LONDON (April 1902): The Royal Physician has announced that King Fredrich Wilhelm was stricken ill during his recent picnic in Norway. "It looks like poisoned caviar, or possibly the knockurst," said Dr. Phidous Quack. The King was evacuated to his castle in the country. It was also announced that Foreign Minister Sir William Hecatt was found hanged in

in his bedroom, with a note written in German pinned to his tongue. Police have appealed to someone who can read German to translate the note.

LONDON (Poderskugg News Service): Salome Whipshanks, exotic dancer and local representative of Glubdrubb & Felerabend, reports that the Honest Note, as it is now called, reads, "I can't believe I swallowed the whole thing."

LONDON, THE ADMIRALTY (May 1902): First Lord of the Admiralty Sir Salty Snotcrust, has refused to comment on reports that a new secret weapon has been developed to augment the Royal Navy. "I refuse to comment," he said, "and furthermore, Project Lemming is still undergoing testing."

MOSCOW (15 February 1902): The Chairman of the Committee of One today demanded that the English army in Norway vacate that country immediately. Citing pressure from the Society for the Prevention of Ecological Disasters as the impetus behind this demand, the Chairman reported that the English landing in Norway had resulted in the tramping down of many acres of good grassy picnic grounds. He vowed to send an army into Norway to see that the English do indeed leave and to pick up the tramped-down grass.

FINLAND (16 February 1902): Russian forces today began to gather on the Norwegian border, carrying rakes and assorted garden tools in addition to their regular arms, in anticipation of an order to move into Norway to rout the bloody British and to pick up the grass at tramped-down picnic sites. Local officials admitted there appeared to be some confusion as to what exactly was happening when the ranks of the army were swelled by countless thousands of young Russians. Y see, we take Belgium see, and we invest it, OK? And after 10 years it oins so much interest, see we give it back to de Belgians, see, wit parts da interest, an' we keeps da rest. Shazky, huh?"
