

THE RIGHT STUFF - THE BOOK HAS IT, THE MOVIE DOESN'T Just finished reading The Right Stuff by Tom Wolfe and watching the movie of the same name. The book has it, the movie doesn't. I can't believe the director and producer of the movie did what they did and that this movie was nominated for Academy Awards. The book is very good. Tom Wolfe makes some very interesting contrasts between the background and talents of the astronauts, the job they had to do, the image the American public fostered, and the perspective of their wives and others around them. A very intriguing book for someone who lived through that era and saw primarily what the media showed us. From this sound story, the makers of the movie screwed up royally. The acting was superb, can't fault the actors. The movie was terrible. My expectations color my thinking of course. expected the movie's message to be the same or similar to the book's. I don't know what the movie was supposed to say. It said some very silly things. There are at least three things in the movie that I hated. In one scene, supposedly of a high level government meeting to discuss who should be sent up in the Mercury capsules, the movie has two stooges going through a comedy routine of showing surfers, a high wire act, a couple being shot from a cannon, race car drivers, etc. It was a dumb and unbelievable scene. The use of parody was out of place following what seemed to be an honest attempt to portray the heroic character of Chuck Yeager. The second dumb scene shows aboriginies chanting beside a huge fire which is casting sparks into the air as John Glenn passes over and observes seeing a "firefly" phenomenon moving with the capsule. The insinuation is insulting. Finally, the book paints a great and relevant description of the formality of how wives are informed that their test pilot husband have just died in a crash. The movie tries to make the same statement with a scene with a gaunt, tall undertaker-looking gentleman coming to the door. What goes wrong is that same person keeps showing up, even 14 years or so later at the first Mercury launch site. That's a ridiculous use of a poetic image. About the only thing that the movie had going for it was good special effects, acting, and an excellent characterization of Chuck Yeager.







But how can NBC show a full match in a 90 minute slot, which means at least 18 minutes of commercials? Including the pre-match rambling and post-match talking, that leaves little time for showing action."

Nairobi, Kenya

Police arrested two officials of the Mwangeka soccer team for using bird feathers and other "witchcraft paraphernalia" to put a curse on the opposition goalkeeper, the Kenyan News Agency said yesterday.

The incident took place during a district league game in the village of Wundanyi in western Kenya.

The report said early in the game two unidentified officials

threw ash mixed with soil and bird feathers near the goal of the opposing club, Civil Servants of Wundanvi.

A league official warned them against the practice but when the second half began the officials did the same thing at the opposite end of the field. They were apprehended by police and jailed.

Mwangeka won, 43, on penalty kicks, but the result was nullified by the Kenya Football Federation, which ordered the game replayed.

Rugby player bites ear lobe off opponent


SINGAPORE (UPI) — A national-team rugby player bit off part of a rival's ear during a scrum and faces an inquiry by the Singapore Rugby Union.


