We had to overcome some pretty good players too, like George Graessle, Jim

McPhail, Tim Allen and James Wall. Good luck to all of them.

Last but not least, thanks to Judy Winsome our GM. Although I think a few of m attempts at humor offended her, she's a good sport and very professional in all aspects of the game. She's even allowed to be eccentric and bizarre since she lives in California.

((Same to you Cowboy! I like your priorities and I don't remember ever being offended. I had just as much fun as you did, I think. I certainly enjoyed your attention. Good luck in your other games. I hope we meet sometime in person and on the Diplomacy battlefield. You'll recognize me by my eccentric brassiere.))

FRANCE (George Graessle) Taking over a 3 center France in F07, against two 14 center allies isn't much fun. I did all I could to survive, and the fact that neither Austria or Russia answered my letters didn't help, but then that's

Diplomacy.

I probably would have had to of been around from the beginning to understand it all, especially the Austrian and Russian relationship with each other, but I did see one interesting occurance that will stick in my mind for a while. With Austria at 17 centers and the 18th a cinch to be had, and Russia NMR's, why Austria didn't move to win the game is beyond me. Loyalty is one thing, foolishness is another. After Russia NMR'd I couldn't fault Austria if he grabbed the win, especially with victory so close, and the fact that a second NMR by Russia would cause a new leader who could care to seek the win on his/her own. Why take the chance? Please, keep in mind this is just my opinion, though at a recent Byrne-con I asked several people what they would do in such a situation. The majority would of grabbed the win, seeing Russia's NMR not as the excuse for the betrayal, but as the reason to take the win. That show of loyalty has been rare in the games that I've seen, and depending on the circumstances it could be admired, questioned or ridiculed. But it provided me with food for thought.

((I think you will get some clues from Austria's statement above. Some things have a momentum of their own, and fortunately, friendship's one of them. As for Diplomacy, I would just take note of that linkage should you ever get in another game with the Hawley-Morris duo. I don't mind that kind of cross-gaming, I don't mind any kind actually, if you know it's a possibility it helps the predictability. Congratulations on your survival, it was tough! And thanks for

the kind note on Looking Ahead.))




