

COMMENTARY


WL is, as advertised, a fun 'zine that doesn't really want to get involved in a feud or be used as a political soapbox, but I do want to comment on some of the controversy currently in the hobby. From what I've read in Mark Berch's DIPLOMACY DIGEST, (which I don't sub to, can't get a trade to, but get from one of my good friends when he's through with it) there seems to be some talk about those pubbers who don't GM games, don't (or no longer) play Postal games, but give the impression of being an authority and/or a personality in the hobby. It appears that pubbers that exist as the antithesis of these aforementioned few want them to shut up, stop publishing, and stop "lording over" the hobby. In general it appears that these hobby critics (as opposed to hobby artists) are not welcome by the GMing and playing pubbers. The criticism is that they only criticize those who do while they do not. Well, if you can understand that then you're doing better than I.

This is my opinion on the subject. In most artisan environments, there exist critics of the art. These critics are seldom in wholesale favor of the artisan community, but yet they exist. Take Siskal and Ebert who do "Sneak Previews" for PBS and are probably some of the most nationally known film critics. I rather doubt that the directors that they pan in their reviews are amongst their biggest fans. Neither are the actors, writers, producers, and other artisans that they fail to like. Yet, these critics exist. Do you think that they would exist if the readers of the Chicago newspapers for which they work didn't read their columns or if the TV viewers didn't watch them or the public sponsors of PBS didn't like them? No! So, who is to decide. Certainly not the artisans.

What I'm driving at is that eventually the consumer is the deciding entity. If no one likes this 'zine or thinks my words or opinions have merit, then no one will subscribe or trade and Winsome Losesome will fold. This 'zine exists as do their 'zines and their detractors' 'zines all exist at the will of the hobbyists. The hobbyists will decide if the hobby is to be split. The hobbyists will decide whose publications will live and whose will die. Even a lifteime membership to the inner circle of Postal Diplomats is not a guarantee of perpetuity of publishing. So, my opinion, for what it's worth, is that the primordial laws of supply and demand and the good sense of the hobby in general will prevail. If a person's opinion is not respected it will rarely be solicited.

LOSESOME LOSESOME MORE

That was the good news, now for the bad: I went to see "SHOCK TREATMENT", the new film by Richard O'Brian who did "ROCKY HORROR PICTURE SHOW". Some of you may remember that I am a ROCKY HORROR fan. I'm not, however, a SHOCK TREATMENT fan. As a film it is probably fundamentally better than RHPS. It undoubtedly had a larger budget, is better produced, and may even have a better script. But—it cannot stand on its artistic merit. To put things in perspective, though, RHPS is not in itself a good film. It is a cult film and it is the cult audience and their response/reaction that gives it its draw. In this regard, the audience has created a success out of mediocrity. One thing is possibly true, you cannot start out to create a successful cult film. You make a film, and if it's too bad to stand on its own merit and you are very lucky, it may become a cult film. The audience has pulled RHPS out of the disposal, but if Mr. O'Brian thinks that they will do it again, he may be sadly disappointed. I personally feel that the audience may feel used if they are expected to react in RHPS fashion to ST. It is the "organized spontaneity" (to coign a self-contradictory phrase) of RHPS that is the fun. Although ST has made room for this interaction, the motivation to provide it is not there. This is just one lady's opinion but I'm the publisher so I'll print it. (note: WINSOME LOSESOME recognizes its responsibility to provide opposing viewpoints to this editorial. If anyone has anything to add or if anyone has wasted or not wasted their money on this flick and wants to respond, feel free to write to me, and if I feel like it, I'll print it.)

HOUSERULES REVISITED

I have received several constructive comments on my houserules. I am somewhat taken aback by how eager to help and how helpful everyone has been. I have decided to change or add some things to my houserules on the basis of those suggestions. First, it was suggested that I separate Winter '01 season since that has become the general practice. I guess my newness to the hobby is showing. I also received the suggestion to split seasons whenever there are 3 or more retreats or removals. This was suggested to avoid writing several contingency orders. I have decided to include the first suggestion, but not the second. I believe my rule to split the season at the request of at least 2 players will solve the problem of several contingency orders. If there's too many to make, request a split and ask your allies to do so too. If you have no allies who will go along with you, writing several contingency orders will just have to be part of the struggle. I am amending WL Houserule VI to add the sentence:

"Winter '01 season will be split."

Another suggestion was to use the internal date, not the postmark, when more than one set of orders for a season are received. I agree with that suggestion and will change the $\underline{\text{WL}}$ Houserule III to read:

"III. Orders - Since this is Postal Diplomacy, all orders must be received in the mail. That is, it must arrive at the GM's address by official Postal Carrier. Hand delivered orders, phoned orders, telegraphed orders, etc., will not be accepted. Orders must be received by Midnight at the close of the posted deadline date in this manner or be deemed No Move Received. Orders must contain the following to be valid orders:

- 1) the game identification number (the Boardman number, variant number, or WL assigned temporary number.
- 2) the country represented by that order
- 3) the season for which that order is intended
- 4) the date of the order
- 5) the signature of the player

The "order" of orders will be determined by the date of the order in that the most recently dated orders will be given priority. If two orders have the same date and there is not obvious priority assignment, conflicting orders between the two will be treated as ambiguous and those affected units will be unordered."

SOME CHEAP ANSWERS

The volume of mail has increased dramatically since I started receiving plugs in the other 'zines. In order to respond to some of the questions, I am going to broadcast my answers and fill some space:

MORE CHEAP ANSWERS

Gary Coughlan - I am surprised that you find it difficult to believe that someone completely unknown to the hobby can suddenly be a full-fledged publisher. My involvement has been primarily FTF so it is not difficult to be unknown outside my own little group, yet have some knowledge about the hobby. Right now, I just want to publish and have an outlet for my thoughts. Thanks for your kind comments about WL. I hope you don't mind me replying in my 'zine.

INQUIRIES

This is a forum for general inquiries or the solicitation of opinion on hobby related topics. These may be attributed to the "asker" or, like, Dear Abby, with names like "Unsure". In my last two issues I've been playing with the question:

"What's wrong with Coastal Creep (also called Coastal Crawl)?"

I received another explanation, this from John Michalski of Moore, OK:

'...what's this about wanting to know wy coastal creep fails? Heck, why does A Par - Bre, A Bre - Par fail? The answer to each is the same, because the situation is the same. F Por - Spa (NC), F Spa (SC) - Por. If you allow one, you have to allow the other. And when you allow both, and S'01 sees A Ven-Tri, F Tri-Ven, you're off to GMing a really fun game, hey? (Fall sees F Ven S A Vie - Tri, and maybe the Italian A Tri retreats to Vienna, right?) Think about it.'

John, I agree you've painted a ridiculous picture if I agree with your points to the end. But I stop agreeing when you say that if I allow one I have to allow the other. I guess I think in terms of boundaries or corridors when I consider the rule prohibiting two forces from trading places with each other. In the case of A Par - Bre and A Bre - Par, the moves fail because the boundary or corridor between the two provinces will not allow both to pass at once. However, the fact that Spain is split into two coasts seems to me to allow passage out one side and in another so F Por - Spa (NC) and F Spa (SC) - Por do not bother me. With respect to A Ven-Tri and F Tri-Ven, I consider the boundary between the two to not allow that move. Although fleets are thought of as passing along the coastline the corridor between the provinces includes the coastline so the move would not be allowed. I suspect that I have gotten myself into a logical trap and must forfeit any hope of joining MENSA. Do any of you see one?

Mark Keller of Orangevale, CA has suggested a new topic. How will I GM the 3 situations brought up in the article "Still More About Convoys" in Diplomacy World #29, and why will I do it that way? I will try to obtain a copy of that article and answer the question in the next issue. Perhaps my answers will elicit more questions. Don't you just love it?


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


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
