At least Steve doesn't doubt I'm a woman - he just doubts I'm real. I wonder which is worse?

INQUIRIES

This is a forum for general inquiries or the solicitation of opinion on hobby related topics. These may be attributed to the "asker" or, like, Dear Abby, with names like "Unsure". In my last three issues I've played with the question:

"What's wrong with Coastal Creep (also called Coastal Crawl)?"

and decided not to allow it in regular DIP games so they won't be considered variants. However, I am surprised that I haven't received any challenges to my boundary or corridor method of interpretation. But on to the next question.

Mark Keller of Orangevale, CA suggested we examine the 3 situations of the article "Still More About Convoys" published in <u>Diplomacy World</u> #29, (Rod Walker, "alcala", 1237 Crest Dr., Encinitas, CA, 92024 \$6.00 per year for 4 issues). In this article, Mark Berch describes 3 situations which create contradictions in the rules.

Situation A is called "The Unwanted, Unnecessary Convoy"

ENGLAND: F Nrg C FRENCH A Cly - Edi

FRANCE: A Cly - Edi

RUSSIA: F Bar - Nrg S F Nwy

France believes his army should move from Clyde to Edinburgh because they are adjacent provinces and the move is unopposed. England retorts that the convoy is disrupted because her fleet in the Norwegian Sea was dislodged. So by Rule XII.3 the army cannot move. Now England is free to retreat to Edinburgh which would not have been possible if she had merely moved there.

Mark Berch called Situation B "The Finessed Cut"

ENGLAND: F Nth C FRENCH A Bel - Hol

FRANCE: A Bel - Hol

RUSSIA: F Den - Nth S by F Hol

Here France thinks she cuts the Russian support. But by Rule XII.5, a convoyed army's attack does not cut support given to an attack upon the convoying fleet. The English fleet, therefore, is dislodged. The rules conflict is between X and XII.5. Mark suggested that the crafty finesse be allowed and the English fleet dislodged.

Situation C is called "The Chicken & Egg Convoys"

ENGLAND: A Yor - Hol C by F Nth and S by A Kie

FRANCE: F Eng - Nth S by F Lon RUSSIA: F Den - Nth S by F Hol

In this case, the English F Nth is a Beleaguered Garrison (Rule IX.5). Since the French and Russian attacks are of equal strength, neither succeeds and the fleet is not dislodged. By not being dislodged, the convoy is still valid (XII.3). The convoyed attack on Holland does not cut the support given by F Hol for F Den - Nth (XII.5). But F Hol has no support and the convoyed army's attack is supported from Kiel, so the F Hol is dislodged. Now Rule X says that a dislodged unit cannot give support in any circumstance. The F Hol can't be dislodged unless the convoy succeeds and the convoy can't succeed if the F Hol is dislodged. An insoluble problem.

INQUIRIES CONTINUED

IN <u>APPALLING GREED</u> #23, Mark Larzelere printed a letter from Allan Calhamer in which Allan proposed some rule changes.

"First, to change X. CUTTING SUPPORT by adding at the end of the first paragraph, just after "... then does not receive it", the expression,

"(Except for the infrequent situation of Rule XII.5.)"

Rule XII.4 would be changed in its entirety to:

- 4. AMBIGUOUS CONVOY ROUTES. The orders as written may permit more than one route by which a convoyed army could proceed from its source to its destination.
- Example 12. A Con-Bul, F Bla C A Con-Bul, F Aeg C A Con-Bul. Furthermore, the fleets may or may not belong to the same country as the army or each other. There may be multiple sea routes but no land route. In these cases:
- a) If the order to the army specifies just one route, that route only is considered.
- b) Subject to the foregoing, if at least one fleet of the same country as the army is ordered to convoy it, the overland route is not considered.
- c) Subject to the foregoing, if the army could make its move, if unopposed, overland; no route employing a foreign fleet is considered.
- d) Subject to the foregoing, the army's move takes effect if any route remaining survives disruption.

Rule XII.5 would be changed in its entirety to:

5. A CONVOYED ATTACK DOES NOT CUT A SUPPORT GIVEN INTO A BODY OF WATER. If a convoyed army attacks a fleet which is supporting another fleet, while that other fleet is ordered to move to or remain in a body of water, this attack by the army does not cut that support.

Example 13. FRANCE: A Spa-Nap, F Lyo C A Spa-Nap, F Tyr C A Spa-Nap, A Apu S A Spa-Nap; ITALY: F Ion-Tyr, F Nap S F Ion-Tyr. Since the support is not cut, in this case the chain of fleets is disrupted, hence the convoy fails, even though it was supported at Naples.

Such a support will not be cut by a convoyed army, even in cases in which the convoy succeeds and the army dislodges the fleet.

Obviously, these suggestions contain my naive hope that the paradoxes will be gotten rid of."

These seem good to me, any comments?

MORE OPENINGS

Mark Larzelere, 23 Akin Ave, Capitol Heights, MD, 20743, has openings for limited press games in <u>APPALLING GREED</u>. Each player may submit no more than 3 lines of press per issue (about 225 characters). The sub rate is 35 cents per issue. Send (1) your name, address, and, if you wish, your phone number, (2) \$8.50 for the game fee of which \$3.50 will be refunded if you do not drop your position; paid in either money or subscription credit to AG, (3) a preference list of the 7 countries, (4) any password you want to use, and (5) a list of any players that you do not want to be in a game with (confidential). These games have DIAS (what's that?), 3 week deadlines (6 weeks for Spring '01 with Winter 1900 press), no neutral orders for Spring '01 if anyone NMRs.
