This is how I list a typical entry:

THE ZINE'S NAME: the editor(s)/publisher(s) name his/her/their address

the zine's price, the format, the method of printing, the page count, the frequency, the issue # of the last issue (and when it was published), the circulation of the zine, the month and year the zine started.

The games currently being run in the zine (the # of each game is in brackets) .

A list of game openings i.e. games which need more players (the price of gamefees is in brackets).

Each entry is rounded off by a brief description of the zine. Many of these are witty, bright and profound comments on the quintessential nature of the zine, bearing the editor's initials. The dull, run of the mill entries will have been written by me and will bear no initials.

If you're interested in a zine, don't send the editor money straight away. First, make certain that the zine is still in publication and accepting new subscriptions. Most editors will be happy to send you a sample copy of their zine in return for the cost of an issue in 22¢ stamps.

Trax is the home of the first postal game of Empire Builder. It is possible that a second EB game, or a game of British Rails, will open soon. The zine contains occasional articles or letters limited strictly to the above mentioned games, but the focus is definitely on the one game I'm running - some issues contain nothing more. If you're not playing, there's not really much of interest.

YVSC is the publication of the US Orphans Service. By the time you read this, it will probably be in the hands of the new Orphans Director, Rod Walker.

HOBBY SERVICES

There are many services provided by individual hobby members. These are run by dedicated people and operate on a strict loss-making basis. All you are asked to do is use and enjoy them.

This costs a mere \$1 and contains a wide variety of articles intended to introduce newcomers to the hobby. There are articles by Tom Murst on preventing stabs, Bob Olsen on press and variants and Kathy Byrne on women in Diplomacy. An invaluable publication for anyone who wants to find out more about the hobby.

This also costs \$1 and contains many articles which novices would find both interesting and informative. Articles include a history of the hobby by Rod Walker, Francois Cuerrier on stabs and Mark Berch on tactics. This is another invaluable publication for anyone new to the hobby.

This is a novice handbook and is best described in a review by Lu Henry: "New (and old) Dip players would be well advised to invest \$3 for...a well done 21 page article... explaining many of the nuts and bolts matters relating to postal Dip that have nothing to do with strategy and tactics but which you have to know to play the game well."

Black & Blue Book, 1986-87: Larry Peery Box 8416. San Diego, CA 92102-0416

This is the hobby's own telephone book with a difference. Instead of just name listings, you can also find people by looking in its separate Area Code and Zip Code listings. The 1986-87 edition includes well over a thousand names, as well as publications, and services/organizations devoted to the hobby in North America. If it's fundamental to the hobby, it's in the BBB. It costs \$6.

<u>Lexicon of Diplomcy:</u> Mark Berch 492 Naylor Place, Alexandria, VA 22304

This is a glossary of the hobby and its history, including scores of tactical ploys, variants, organizations, openings, GMing and publishing jargon, famous press bylines, strategic concepts scoring and ratings systems, various tricks, special projects (many never implemented), a wide variety of flotsam and jetsam plus a few ringers. Alphabetized with over 450 entries plus an accompaning text. 35 pages for \$1.25. Son of Leticon is an update with 150 new entries, corrections of old entries and a subject index to Diplomacy Digest \$1-57. 12 pages for a mere 50¢.

Would you like to receive a large selection of the zines listed in the <u>Zine Register?</u> If you do, then all you have to do is send Ken \$2.50 (to cover postage) and, in return, you will receive as many zines as can be crammed into a large envelope (usually 15-20). To avoid duplication, please let Ken know which zines you receive already.

<u>Pontevedria</u> is a list of postal game openings for Diplomacy in North America (and a few eisewhere). It is sort of associated with the <u>Zine Register</u> and <u>Diplomacy World</u>. The list is updated continuously between issues and it is available for a mere SSAE.

KGO is another list of game openings. It is an independent hobby service published continuously since 1974. It is not as comprehensive as <u>Pont</u> but it does contain information on non-Diplomacy openings. It is sometimes accompanied with <u>KGO Zine Directory</u>, a cheaper but far less comprehensive version of the <u>Zine Register</u>. Both are available for an SSAE.

For \$3 you can receive <u>Once Upon A Deadline</u>, a 204 page novice editor's package. It contains articles on virtually every conceivable aspect of Gming games and publishing a zine. It is very useful for anyone who would like to start their own zine.

This 30-page special edition of <u>TRAX</u> is designed to belp people get started running Empire Builder and/or British Rails games. The centerpiece is a long, detailed essay on how I go about ranning a game in my zine. Also included is a typical adjudication for a game turn, my housefules, a letter column and more. It costs \$1.

The job of BNC is to assign Boardman Numbers to new Diplomacy games and list Diplomacy gamestarts and finishes. If you want to find out more about this service, you should get hold of a copy of <u>Everything</u> the BNC service zine.

The job of MNC is to list Diplomacy variant gamestarts and finishes. If you want to find out more about this service, you should send off for a copy of Alpha & Omega, the MNC service zine.

We have maps and rules on hand for about 700 Diplomacy variants. Most are available for sale 9 10% per page. The Bank produces a Catalog which lists games according to their various categories. The categories are explained in the introductory material. While they last copies of the old Catalog are available for \$1. The 1986 Catalog sells for \$3.00. Eventually, there will be an updated Catalog which will also sell for \$3.00. There are variants for almost every time period and every part of the world, as well as games played on the regular board with all sorts of rule changes. The best way to find out what's available is through the Catalog.

The last public-postal archive; desires universal trades and any unwanted zines (excess duplicates to be sent to the Zine Bank), and any closing collections. The Archivist (who has professional archival experience) will locate and copy information on request on games, players, zines etc. for minimal costs. Goal at present: a complete set (or near enough) from 1977 to present; all zines, flyers, newsletters of postal gaming. For details ask for the Granite Archives house organ, <u>Poundation</u>.

Tracing its roots back to Walt Buchanon's original hobby archives, the IDS Archives include the largest collection of Diplomacy publications and memoriabiliain the hobby. More than 30,000 Diplomacy publications are included, ranging from the 7,500 piece Larry Peery collection, to the Don Miller Memorial Collection, to copies of Dippy publications from all over the world, and photos from the 1984 Olympics Diplomacy event. Where else would you find translations of the Rules of Diplomacy in English, French, French-Canadian, Spanish, Mexican-Spanish, Mex-Tex, German, Dutch, Farsi and Fiscanian?

Sometimes a zine in which you're playing will stop publishing without warning or suffer from excessive delays. If this happens, you might want to contact the Orphans Service so that your games can continue in another zine. The service might also be able to help you recover subscription money, if it is not returned when a zine folds. For further information see the entry for Yes, Virginia, There is a Santa Claus.

THE INTERNATIOANL SUBSCRIPTION EXCHANGE

Even though the major growth area of the hobby is Europe, transatlantic contact is still relatively small. This is a shame since there are always openings for international Diplomacy games. If you would like to subscribe to any of the zines listed from abroad, you should consider using the ISE.

The International Subscription Exchange: continued.....

Here is how the service works. Let us suppose you are an American who wants to subscribe to Mission From God. All you have to do is send Simon Billenness a check for (about) \$10. Make sure you tell him which zine the money is for and whether you would like to receive the zine by air or seamail. (To compare, airmail is fast - 3 to 10 days - but more expensive. Seamail is much cheaper but letters take over a month.) Simon will then inform Doug Rowling of your request and Doug will send the editor concerned (in this example Pete Tulk) the equivalent sum in pounds sterling. The service is now fairly quick and it certainly saves you from the ridiculous fees banks charge you for exchanging foreign currencies.
